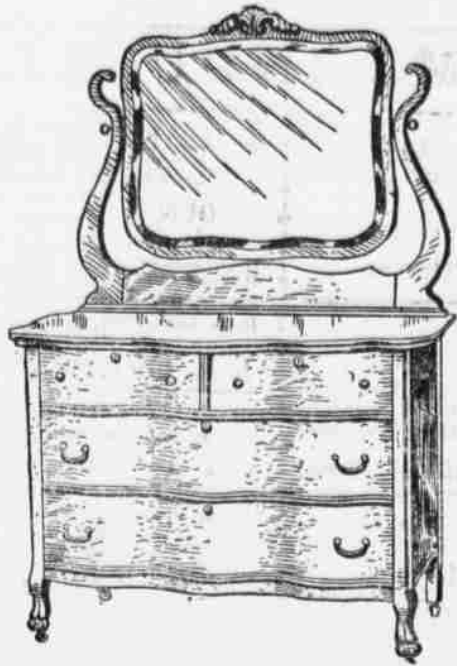

## LOCAL BETTING FAVORS TAFT

**Many Small Wagers Made On Outcome of Presidential Election Next Tuesday.**

Considerable interest has developed on Coos Bay the last few days in the presidential election, and a number of wagers have been made. The betting favors Taft. One small wager was made that Bryan would not come as near being elected this year as in his previous campaigns.

Dr. C. W. Tower, president of the Millicoma Club, announced today that arrangements had been made to put in a special wire to the club rooms to receive results next Tuesday night. The club will have a special operator and will receive the returns until considerably after midnight. Of course, the returns Tuesday night will be far from complete but they will give an idea of how the eastern states are going and it is generally believed that the outcome hinges on New York and Indiana and possibly Illinois.

Sheriff W. W. Gage came over from Coquille today with the ballots, boxes and other supplies for the precincts in this section. Oregon voters will merely express their preference on the presidential tickets, the state and county election having been held in June.

dale moved so that it will benefit more people.

F. P. Norton's claim for \$426.21 rebate on his street assessment, he having built the street around his residence by private contract, was referred back to Mr. Norton to secure the O. K. of the general contractor of that street.

Messrs. J. W. Bennett and Tom Magnus were ordered to fix the sidewalk approach of West 'A' street to Broadway; also to arrange to drain 'A' street west and to lower the plank paving to correspond with the bituminous rock paving on Broadway.

Messrs. Carrigan and Cordes were ordered to fix the sidewalk approaches of west 'B' street leading to Broadway where the grade was changed by the new paving.

### No New Fire Hose.

The city council last night deferred the purchase of additional fire hose until next spring. Fire Chief Tom Nicols requested the council to buy 1,000 feet more of hose sometime ago, but Councilman Savage said that the fire and water committee had decided that the city could get along for a while without it.

A representative of a supply company was present and offered the hose at seventy cents per foot, twenty cents less than the city has been buying it.

It was proposed that if the new hose was bought that some of the old hose and equipment be divided between Ferndale and South Marshfield and give those sections additional protection.

Finally, it was decided to have Tom Rook make a test of all fire fighting apparatus and make a complete report to the city council on December 1. Then the inventory will be gone over and what is needed determined and a tax levy made to pay for it.

### Business Next Monday.

Owing to election falling on Tuesday, it was decided to hold the next meeting next Monday night. The teamsters license matter will be brought up and an ordinance probably adopted to take effect January 1.

An ordinance creating the position of city electrician and providing for the inspection of all wiring and fixing the charges for inspection will also be brought up for adoption then.

### Wire Lockhart.

Mayor Straw proposed that the city council wire congratulations to Councilman Lockhart over the birth of a baby girl to Mr. and Mrs. Lockhart at San Francisco. Sacchi said that if it was done, the city officials should pay for the telegram out of their own pockets. A collection of ten cents apiece was taken up and the congratulatory message sent. Somebody proposed that the telegram express sympathy because it was not a boy, but the others insisted that it be merely of congratulation.

### Other Matters.

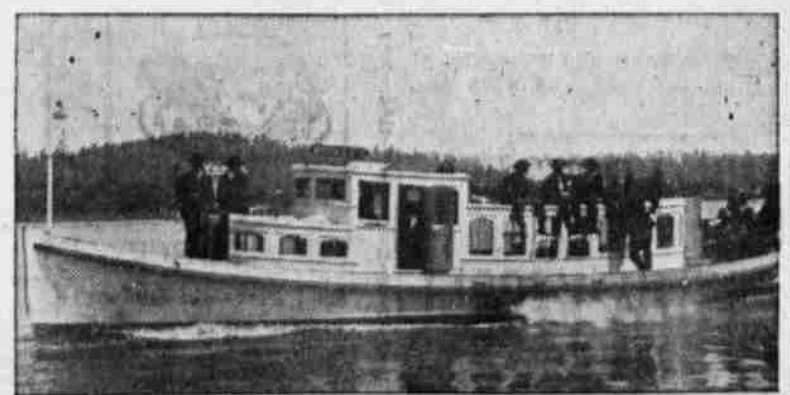
