HAVE WE A DEBT LIMIT?

This is a question that Marshfield must ask herself, and answer, in a very short time!
Municipalities, like individuals, have a limit of responsibility in money matters that may not be transcended, and the hour for business reflection always arrives. We are not setting the hour; though we might do so with perfect justice to the city and ourselves, but we are going on record with a suggestion that may well be heeded; that is, for the present administration, its successors, and the property-owners of the city, to have a care of the lengths to which the public credit is carried, from this time on. It is not necessary to array the figures that prompt this hint they are well-known where they will assert themselves at the hour mentioned, and while there is no cause for anxiety at the moment, the danger line may be in sight at any time, and we should be prepared to avoid it with honor and safety.
There are people who do not know a danger line when they see it; who are reckless of all warnings; who see only their special interests in the schemes of the hour and care for nothing else so long as they are achieved; to whom it is useless to plead for the abatement of public expenditures, since public expenditure and private gain are often synonymous terms. But to those who have the broader concern of the general public at heart, as well as their own particular share in both the extravagance and economy of the day and place, we insist upon urging the question that is used as a caption hereto.

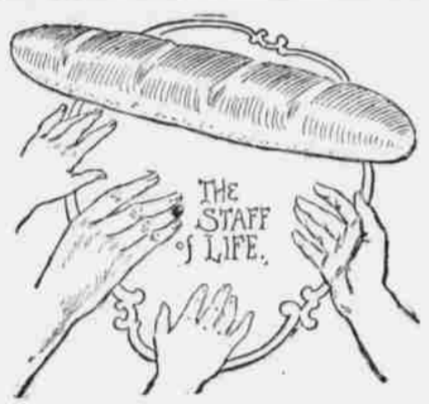
