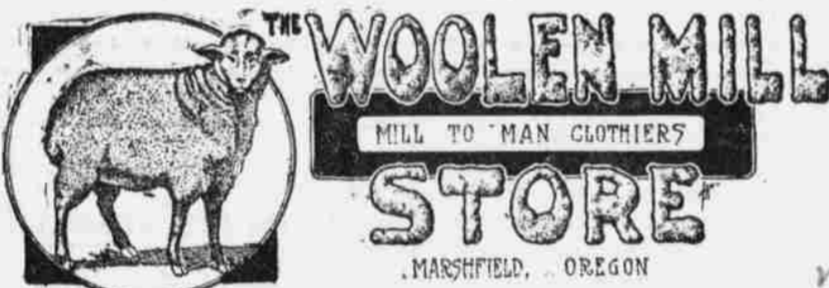

City Council Tonight.—The Marshfield city council will meet tonight instead of tomorrow night, Tuesday being election day. Several matters will come up for discussion and possibly the new building ordinance and the ordinance to name and number the streets will be brought up for discussion.

One Train a Day.—Today, the new winter time card of the local railway went into effect. Henceforth there will be but one train a day between here and Coquille, leaving Marshfield
