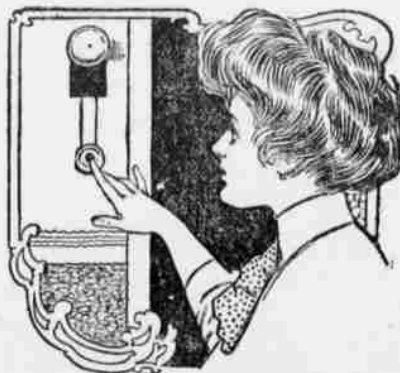

Will Sail Tuesday.—F. S. Dow received word today that the M. F. Plant will sail from San Francisco for Coos Bay next Tuesday evening.

Heron Returning.—J. R. Herron got in from Salt Lake with Dr. Rowell, Teddy and Consecration, which horses will continue on to Marshfield, Ore., to be turned out for the winter.—San Francisco Call.

Play North Bend.—The Marshfield Independent football team which recently defeated the Marshfield high school team will go to North Bend tomorrow to play the independent team of that city on the grounds there in the afternoon. A good game is anticipated and a big turnout from both cities is expected.

Several Cases.—L. A. Liljeqvist has returned from Myrtle Point where he was called on several cases, one being an assault and battery case, growing out of an election controversy. He is investigating several charges of fast driving on county bridges and may prosecute the offenders.

Teams Sent Home.—Contractor W. O. McCann, who has been putting in bituminous rock paving in Marshfield this summer will start his teamsters and teams overland for Eureka in a day or two. He has completed the grading on all of his contracts that can be completed before the rainy season. There is a little more paving to lay and this will be rushed to completion.

Dredge Comes Up Bay.—It is expected that the Dredge Oregon will be brought up from the mouth of Pony Inlet in a day or two to begin

operations in the upper bay near the C. A. Smith mill. The shoal in the lower bay has been practically eliminated. The dredge will gradually work down the bay, clearing the channel as she goes.

Smith is Director.—It is announced that C. E. Smith, head of the Menasha Woodware company, which has extensive holdings in this section, has been elected a director of the Bank or Oregon at North Bend. Mr. Smith is a relative of Henry Hewitt, Jr., of Tacoma, who recently purchased an extensive interest in the bank from L. J. Simpson and A. M. Simpson.

Cargo General Averaged.—Shippers who had freight on the M. F. Plant when the steamship met with the accident crossing out over the Coos Bay bar have been notified that an assessment of ten per cent has been declared against them and the goods are being held in San Francisco until it is satisfied. Many of the shippers are protesting against the freight being general averaged and may take the matter into court.

WINDUP FAIR BUSINESS HERE

Final Settlement of Affairs of Second Southern Oregon Exhibit Made.

A final settlement of the accounts of the Second Southern Oregon District Fair, which was held in Marshfield last August, has just been effected by the directors of the Coos and Curry Fair Association. The final settlement was delayed by the inability to secure the state's portion of the premium money.

Secretary G. W. Carleton has just completed his report, the final summary of which is as follows:
Total receipts of subscriptions from citizens . . . \$1,291.00
Total receipts from Fair . . . 3,680.00

Expenditures preparing fair grounds \$2,579.80
Expense of conducting Fair 4,450.04
\$7,029.84

Balance due outstanding bills \$2,058.84
Fair Made Money.

That the fair was a financial success in addition to being a success in other ways is shown by the above figures, \$521 being derived above the ordinary expenses. While a deficit of over \$2,000 is shown in the report, this is due to the expenditure of about \$2,500 in constructing a grand stand and other improvements on the grounds. These improvements were made under very favorable conditions and it is estimated that if they had to be made now, the cost would be about \$1,000 greater. These improvements are of a permanent nature and practically no expense will be needed to get the grounds in condition for next year's fair.

In order to adjust the matter finally, Mr. Carleton is calling on the contributors to a guarantee fund of about \$900 to pay their portions of it to reduce the debt. The guarantors and the remaining debt will be paid from the earnings from special race meetings and other events to be given in the future.

This season, the management of the fair encountered many obstacles owing to it being the first one held here in years. That it proved a success financially as well as in other respects will be gratifying news to all interested. The 1908 fair's success has paved the one for greater and more successful fairs here in the future and the cooperation of all will undoubtedly be gladly given.

JOY OF LIFE IN COOS COUNTY SHOWN.

MYRTLE POINT, Ore., Nov. 7.—The Enterprise says: "R. C. Dement has returned from a visit of several weeks in the Klamath Falls country. He thinks that if that section was favored with Coos County's climate it would be a great country, but lacking that, it is only great in some respects. They depend upon irrigation for their crops, and at that only certain crops will grow, because of the cold weather with frosts during the summer and freezing winters. During his visit there was a snow storm that covered the ground in the valleys and laid to a depth of six inches in the hills, while occasionally in the winter months the snow falls to depths that will conceal fences from view."
