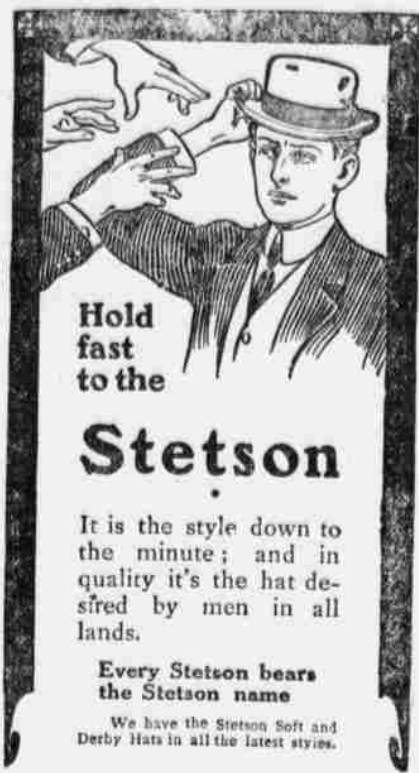

WHEAT EXPORTS TO END.

J. J. Hill Predicts Six Years Nation Will Consume All Raised.
TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 12.—Six years will bring the end of wheat exportation from Puget Sound and other Pacific Coast ports, according to a prediction made here by James J. Hill, chairman of the board of directors of the Great Northern Railroad. The noted magnate asserted that within six years the consumption of wheat by the United States will be so great that it will not more than equal, if it will equal home production.

The Great Northern Railroad has announced its intention of extending to Tacoma in the near future and Mr. Hill during his address announced that the Great Northern will inaugurate through passenger train service daily between Tacoma and Chicago next Spring, providing conditions warrant.

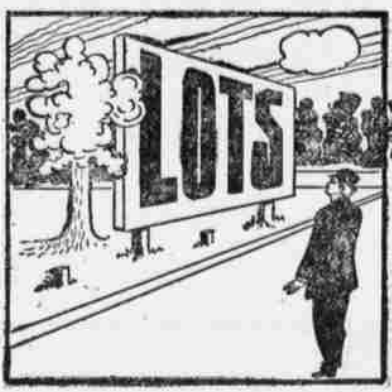
