It was largely attended, many from North Inlet where her parents reside being in attendance. Death was due to epilepsy.

Relative Died.—Peter Mirrasoul and wife, and Chas. Schaufel and wife, have gone to San Francisco to attend the funeral of Mrs. Mirrasoul's mother, Mrs. Siegel, who died there a few days ago.

Leases Ranch.—Anson O. Rogers has leased the Coos River ranch of his father, Anson Rogers, and will conduct the place in the future. Mr. Rogers, Sr., expects to erect a cottage on Fifth street on Knob Hill soon and will move to this city to reside.

Wants Ferry Finished.—John Bear is starting a crusade to secure an early completion of the ferry. He says that nine teams from Roseburg were in Eastside the last few days and wanted to cross over to Marshfield but could not on account of the Marshfield ferry slip not being completed. The matter will probably be taken up with the Marshfield city council.

Court In December.—The adjourned term of circuit court for this county will convene Friday, December 11, and the regular term Monday, December 14. At present there is only one case on the criminal docket and that is of a party at Myrtle Point for shooting a dog. Sheriff Gage says that he has not received any orders to impanel a jury for the coming term, and that probably the court will only consider chancery cases.

Ray of Windsor, Colo., and a daughter, Mrs. J. H. Hurst of Alena, Kas. All were with him shortly prior to his death. The funeral was held at Myrtle Point this week.
