## COOS BAY BAR DEEPENS.

Skipper Says Shoals Due to Recent Storms Disappear.  
PORTLAND, Nov. 14.—Though the Coos Bay bar shoaled badly during the stormy period in October it has begun to scour out again to a good depth, according to Captain B. W. Olsen, of the Alliance. The skipper says that as he was coming out over the bar on this trip he took careful soundings. He found the channel to be about 26 feet deep at high tide, making it 17 feet at low water. In the center of the bar the captain reports that several small lumps are about all remaining of the shoal formed some weeks ago. He predicts that these will soon be carried away at the rate the scouring process is progressing.

The Alliance completed an unusually quick round trip passage, as she did not get away from Portland until last Sunday morning. In addition to a quantity of lumber for Eastern shipment she brought 100 tubs of butter and other farm produce. She also brought a large number of passengers.
