Upton was placed in nomination for recorder.

It was then moved that the caucus should vote by ballot to determine which two of the three nominees should be placed on the ticket. Chairman Smith thought that each person should vote for two candidates and it was decided that this should be done. Tom Hall, Charles McKnight and John D. Goss entered protest against this, claiming that this would be unfair to the weaker candidate and the ruling was reconsidered and each instructed to vote for but one for recorder. The ballot resulted as follows:

John D. W. Butler 188
J. W. Snover 67
J. M. Upton 14

For Three-Year Terms.
The councilman to be elected December 1, are to hold office for three years. The retiring members are Claude Nasburg and J. H. Flanagan. The nomination of D. L. Rood was not expected yesterday as it was generally understood that Mr. Merchant had been selected as Al Owens' running mate. However, Mr. Merchant refused to be a candidate under any circumstances.

A friend of Recorder J. M. Upton today said:

"It is only fair to Mr. Upton to say that his name was used only on the assumption that the three names presented for recorder should be placed on the official ballot."

SOCIALISTS NAME TICKET.

Will Have Candidates in Field For City Election December 1.

The Marshfield Socialists at a meeting at their hall last evening nominated the following ticket for the coming city election:

For Recorder—S. P. Keith.
For councilmen—W. R. Gilmore and Frank Leslie.

Owing to the provisions of the charter, it will be impossible for the Socialists to have their ticket printed on the regular ballot, the charter providing that no names shall be placed on the ticket except those of the nominees at the regular municipal caucus. In consequence of this, it will be necessary for those desiring to vote for the Socialist candidates to write in the names on the ballot at the election.

SMOKED A PIPE 70 YEARS.

Now Julia O'Brien, at the Age of 103, is Dead.
NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—Julia O'Brien, 103 years old, who had smoked a pipe for 70 years, has drawn her last whiff. As the oldest inmate of the St. Francis home, where aged women are cared for by nuns, Mrs. O'Brien died mourned by all, says the American.
Physicians who attend the home say she was the most marvelous woman physically they ever met. She smoked three big pipefuls a day—one when she arose, one after dinner and the third just before retiring. Up to the last she was able to read small type without the aid of glasses.

CHURCH CORNER STONE IS LAID

Exercises of Swedish Lutheran Denomination in North Bend Success.

The laying of the cornerstone of the Swedish Lutheran church at North Bend was one of the most successful events of the kind that has recently taken place on Coos Bay and the assemblage was one of the largest. Despite the threatening weather during the day, no rain fell during the program to mar the exercises or discommode the audience.

The Rev. B. F. Bengtson of Marshfield, had charge of the exercises and laid the cornerstone. The cornerstone laying address was delivered in Swedish. Rev. Bengtson paid tribute to the spirit displayed by the members of the denomination on Coos Bay in making such an edifice possible and also how greatly gratified he was over the marked progress.

Captain Simpson Talks.

Captain A. M. Simpson spoke briefly. He said that while he was not closely identified with any church, he was always glad to see the evidence of the growth of Christianity. He said that he had always tried to aid wherever possible in the building of churches and specified a few of the many contributions he has made. He paid special tribute to the Lutheran faith. In closing, he said that he would personally contribute \$25 towards the church fund.

The site for the church was contributed by L. J. Simpson, son of Captain A. M. Simpson.

The Rev. J. E. Burkhart and the Rev. Rasmussen were the other speakers of the afternoon, both devoting their addresses largely to a tribute to the benefit of Christianity and the beneficial effect of churches upon the welfare of the community. It had been planned to have special musical services but this feature of the program was left out.

AUTO DRIVER KILLED.

Effort to Break Twenty-Four-Hour Record Ends Disastrously.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Nov. 17.—While forcing his Renault car at a speed of more than sixty miles per hour in an effort to lower the 24-hour automobile record, Emile Strycker was almost instantly killed early today on the Fair Grounds track here. Leon Barrows of this city, who was on the car with Strycker was seriously injured. Two tires of the car blew up and instantly the car was a total wreck. Strycker died before medical aid reached him.

PONTIFICAL MASS SAID.

Fiftieth Anniversary of Pope Pius Celebrated By Many.

ROME, Nov. 17.—Pontifical mass was celebrated Monday morning at St. Peter's, the occasion being the fiftieth anniversary of Pope Pius entering the priesthood. It was the most impressive ceremony witnessed in Rome since the coronation of the Pontiff. There were present not less than seventy thousand from all parts of the world.

DREDGE INLET TO BUILD ROAD

Residents of District No. 10 Adopt Novel Scheme in Building Road to Coos Bay.

At the meeting of the electors of Road District, No. 10, at the Ross Inlet school house, it was decided that instead of making improvements in the highway between Sumner and Marshfield now, that the people should wait a short time and in addition to having a better thoroughfare constructed more cheaply to secure the dredging of Catching Inlet at the same time.

This decision was reached after considerable debate. F. E. Wilson pointed out that the proposed expenditure of \$250 per mile for which it was planned to tax the district would not accomplish much and could not possibly reduce the highway to a maximum grade of sixteen per cent unless it was made more winding than a mountain brook. Mr. Wilson suggested that Catching Inlet be dredged, making a fine channel and the dredgings be thrown up on what would be the west side at the mouth and thus make a dike and a roadway.

The plan met with instant approval. While the audience came to the meeting intent on voting a levy sufficient to build the present highway, it was decided by a vote of seventeen to five to adopt the plan of Catching Inlet dredgings.

SUGAR TRUST IS ATTACKED

Government Begins Action to Recover Three Million Dollars.

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—The United States government has brought six suits against the American Sugar Refining Company to recover forfeitures and customs receipts to the amount of \$3,624,121 on sugar delivered by the Havemeyers and Edler refineries in Brooklyn during the past six years. The government alleges fraud in weighing the shipments.

APPEAL OIL CASE.

Government to Present It to U. S. Supreme Court.

CHICAGO, Nov. 17.—District Attorney Sims served notice on the counsel of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana that on November 30, the government will apply to the Supreme Court for a writ of certiorari bringing the record of the famous rebating case before that tribunal.

Air Craft Passes Near San Bernardino.
