Delay Myrtle Point Case.—Judge John F. Hall returned yesterday from Coquille where he expected to convene juvenile court to hear the case of young Kinnicut, the Myrtle Point youth involved in the assault case there. For various reasons, the hearing was postponed until next week.

Telegraph Wires Down.—The Western Union Telegraph wires, between Coos Bay and Roseburg have been down since yesterday afternoon. Manager Schetter has no idea when the break can be repaired. As a result of the wires being down, The Times is unable to present its usual Associated Press news this evening.

Bound Over.—N. S. Olson, the Lakeside postmaster, has been bound over to the grand jury by Justice Pennock on the charge of assault with dangerous weapons which was preferred by George Schroeder as a result of the mixup at Ten Mile last Saturday. Mr. Olson waived the preliminary examination and furnished bonds in the sum of \$200.

Plant Is Delayed.—Agent F. S. Dow today received word that the M. F. Plant had been delayed by a heavy fog at San Francisco Tuesday night and did not get underway for Coos Bay until early Thursday morning. The wind has been in her favor and she will probably reach here tonight but will not cross in until tomorrow unless the bar is unusually favorable.

EASTSIDE NOMINATES SIX CANDIDATES

Half Dozen Enter Race For Councilmen—Election Will Be Held Dec. 8 When Charter Is Voted On.

At a caucus of the voters of Eastside last evening, the following candidates were nominated for councilmen:

Wm. Humbert, A. E. Stonecypher, A. Vineyard, S. S. Ackles, J. Bloom and A. Demose.

Three councilmen are to be elected to succeed A. E. Stonecypher, Robert Kittson and John Mattson. The terms are two years.

The election will be held December 8. At that time, the new charter will also be voted on.

GETS TARGET RANGE.

General Finzer Secures Tract Near Roseburg.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Nov. 20.—Acting as an agent of the Federal Government, Adjutant-General W. E. Finzer, of the Oregon National Guard, purchased a 27-acre tract of land, one mile northeast of the city, for a target range. The price paid was \$1,750. Although title to the land is vested in the United States, the range will be under state control and used exclusively by the state militia. It will become the largest range in the state, affording opportunity for marksmanship tests at 1,200 yards.
