




A beneficent Providence has given us a fertile soil and a delightful and healthful climate. The semi-arid regions are being made to bloom and blossom as the rose and are furnishing homes to thousands of sturdy men and women.

All these are the things that make for a better and a higher civilization and promise ever brighter hopes for a greater Oregon.

Let us therefore suitably observe the day set apart and repair to our usual places of worship there to render thanks to the All-Wise Ruler of the universe for the manifold blessings we enjoy.

Sealed proposals will be received by the Finance Committee of the Common Council of the City of Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon, at the office of the Recorder of said city, in the City Hall of said city, until 4 o'clock p. m., Monday, November 30, 1908, for \$16,023.37 street improvement bonds of the City of Marshfield in denominations not exceeding \$500, bearing interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually; each bond to be dated November 24, 1908, payable ten years from the date thereof; provided that the right is reserved to take up and cancel any of such bonds, upon the payment of the face value thereof, within accrued interest to the date of payment at any semi-annual interest payment period at or after one year from the date of such bond or bonds, by giving thirty days published notice.
