M. C. MALONEY left today on an eastern business trip, going via the Alliance to Portland.

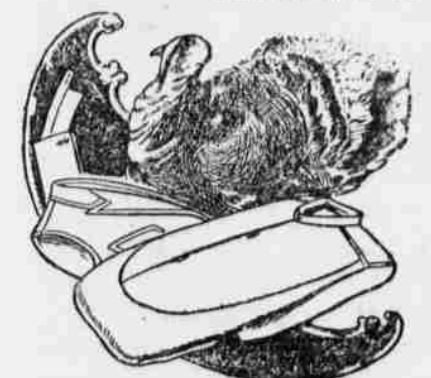
F. C. BIRCH and wife, left today for the George Gould ranch on North Coos River where they will spend Thanksgiving.
