

# OLD CEMETERY PUBLIC PARK

### Southern Oregon Company and City Council Have Matter Under Consideration.

The Marshfield city council last evening received a proposition from the Southern Oregon Company to convert the old cemetery tract near Knob hill into a public park. The tract was originally ceded by the Southern Oregon company for a burying ground, and as it is no longer being used for that purpose, the company still maintains a claim to it. There is between three and four acres and the company believes it could be converted into a public park. In consideration of the ceding of its claim to the ground, the Southern Oregon Company asks that it be granted the privilege of replanting New Bedford addition as it may see fit and that a road be opened through the middle of the tract. The matter was referred to Councilmen Flanagan, Lockhart and Nasburg to take it up with Elijah Smith and determine what shall be done with it.

#### Bill to Albright.

Upon recommendation of Contractor Walter Condron and Councilman Nasburg, the council ordered the city recorder to send a bill for five planks to Carl Albright, one of the candidates for councilman at the coming election. Messrs Condron and Nasburg reported that Mr. Albright had confiscated for his personal use five planks which the city had ordered for temporary street work to be done by Walter Condron for the city.

#### Routine Business Up.

The North Front street improvement, over which W. U. Douglas and the council clashed a few weeks ago, was up again last night. Councilman Sacchi said that he didn't think it was right to impose upon the property owners the cost of the gutter and curb as proposed when it was understood that the street was to be permanently improved next spring. Owing to the advertisement for bids having called for planking and curbing as well as filling, the council feared that it could not collect the assessments unless all the work is done. It was finally decided that the street committee should take the matter up with the property owners and adjust the matter.

A petition from seventeen residents near Flanagan and Nevada streets that an arc light be placed there was referred to the light committee.

A bill from the Waterworks Company for the cost of moving a hydrant at 'C' and Second streets was rejected, the council insisting that it wouldn't pay for the mistake of

the company's employe. The bill was for about \$30.

D. L. Rood, after considerable debate, was ordered a rebate of about \$121 on Second street, he having built a concrete sidewalk instead of the plank walk that was ordered. He did the work personally but had paid the assessment for the plank walk.

Chestnut street grading was accepted from Contractor Flanagan. The Southern Oregon Company wants the side of the grade sloped so that there won't be a landslide. The company's wish will be investigated.

Contractor Walter Condron's contract for grading Cedar street was extended to January 1.

The Lapp claim to certain property that is being utilized by the city in opening a new street was referred to Councilmen Savage, Sacchi and Flanagan to investigate. Councilman Nasburg withdrew from the committee because he has a claim similar to the Lapps.

The assessment for the new improvement of Broadway between Queen and Washington was equalized and ordered collected.

The final plans for improving Broadway south from 'D' to the southern edge of Mills Slough were completed and the contract will be awarded soon.

The assessments for the construction of the sidewalks near the new high school were fixed, being about thirty-six cents per front foot on the abutting property.
