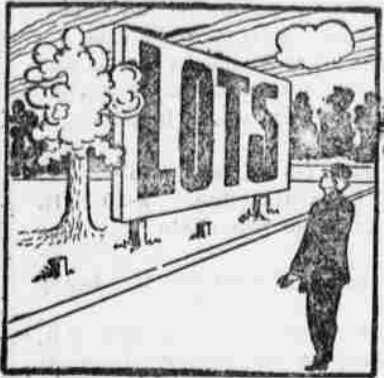

### NOTICE OF ANNUAL MUNICIPAL ELECTION OF THE CITY OF MARSHFIELD.

Notice is hereby given that on Tuesday, the first day of December, 1908, there will be held at the City Hall of the City of Marshfield, Coos County, Oregon, a regular general election, for the purpose of electing two members of the Common Council to serve for the term of three years each; for the purpose of electing one Recorder to serve for the period of one year; and for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of said City for their approval or rejection an ordinance to amend Section 110 of the Charter of said City to increase the limit of indebtedness to five per cent of the assessed valuation of the property within the corporate limits of the City; and for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of said City for their approval or rejection an ordinance to amend Subdivision 34 of Section 28 of the Charter of said City to authorize and empower the Common Council to issue and dispose of Bonds of said City not exceeding the sum of \$42,000.00 payable in not less than ten nor more than twenty years, with interest at the rate of five per cent, for the purpose of redeeming and paying off the warrant indebtedness of said City.

The said election will be held between the hours of nine o'clock A. M. and six o'clock P. M.

That John C. Merchant, A. P. Owen, and R. C. Cordes have been heretofore by the Common Council of said City appointed as Judges of said election, and D. L. Rood, C. H. Marsh and George Farrin as Clerks of said election.

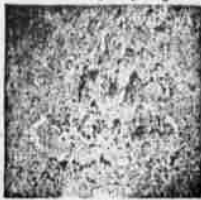

Loggie Is Appointed.—Peter Loggie of North Bend, has just received his credentials as a delegate to the Rivers and Harbors meeting at Washington, D. C., December 9 to 11, inclusive, he having been appointed by Gov. Chamberlain as one of the men to represent Oregon. The meeting is a very important one as its actions will have a prominent bearing on the Harbors and Rivers appropriation bill to be enacted at the coming session of congress. It is likely that the North Bend and Marshfield Chambers of Commerce will unite to see that Mr. Loggie goes.

Boost Vale Congress.—The Marshfield Chamber of Commerce is in receipt of circulars being sent out for the meeting of the Oregon-Idaho Development congress to be held in Vale, Ore., December 17, 18 and 19. Coos Bay harbor is one of the projects that the congress is boosting, and it is hoped to have this section well represented there. Col. Wm. Grimes will be one of the number who will go from here. E. M. Helgou of Welsler, Idaho, vice-president and general manager of the Pacific and Northern Idaho Railway, and a great railroad builder, will be there as will other prominent railroad men.
