## CLARKE BOWMAN DIES SUDDENLY IN PORTLAND

Well-Known Marshfield Man Succumbed at Home of Brother there—Cause of Death not Known.

Clarke Bowman, a resident of Marshfield for a number of years until three or four weeks ago when he removed to Portland, died suddenly there yesterday. A telegram conveying the announcement of his death was received by his father-in-law, N. Nelson, last evening. The cause of death was not given and Mr. Nelson leaves on the Alliance today for Portland to assist his daughter in the funeral arrangements and bring her back.

While here, Mr. Bowman was employed as a printer and made many friends. In Portland, he resided at the residence of his brother, J. D. Bowman, in Montavilla, a Rose City suburb.

Mr. Bowman was survived by his father, Merritt Bowman, of Portland, and two brothers, J. D. Bowman of Portland, and Alvin Bowman of Falls City, Ore. Several married sisters also survive.

Mrs. Bowman was formerly Ella Gertrude Nelson of Marshfield. She and their eight-year-old daughter, Jane Pearl, will probably return to make their home with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Nelson, at the corner of Second and 'C' streets.

The funeral will probably be held in Portland as Mr. Bowman's mother is buried there.

Another brief message to Mr. Nelson stated that death was caused by heart failure.
