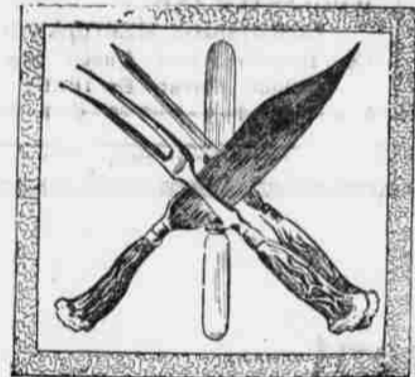

Ferry Carries Many.—During the month of November, the ferry boat plying between Marshfield and Eastside carried 2,196 passengers. The machinery of the ferry has been causing some difficulty, the clutches being too light and necessitating running it one way only. New clutches are being secured so that it can run direct without turning around. When it runs direct, it makes it in about three minutes while an additional minute is required in turning around.

North Bend Man Loses.—Notice was received here today that the Oregon supreme court had upheld the decision of the lower courts in the case of Jacob L. Stern vs. A. J. Volz, alias John Volz. The case arose over a debt alleged to have been contracted by Volz in Boise, Idaho. Volz tried to show that he was in North Bend at the time he was alleged to be in Boise, but L. A. Liljeqvist who prosecuted produced numerous affidavits to the contrary and the lower courts held against Volz. Volz is now running a saloon in North Bend and about \$325 is involved in the action.

## THREE MEN SUBSCRIBE \$225 FOR NEW FUND

Money to Defray Expenses of Coos Bay Representatives at Capital Coming Readily.

The subscriptions for the fund to defray the expenses of Coos Bay's representatives at Washington and Salem this winter are coming in good shape. G. W. Carleton started the circulation of the subscription paper late yesterday and before noon today, the following subscription had been made:

Mr. Hermann while directly representing the Coquille valley, will be helping Coos county and Coos Bay and many of the local boosters feel that Marshfield might assist in that fund.

## F. S. DOW WINS SUIT AGAINST COURTNEY MILL

Circuit Court Upholds Lien For About \$500 Against Bankrupt—Held to Be Prior to Mortgage.

Word has been received here that Judge Hamilton of the Circuit court, has upheld the lien of F. S. Dow against the Courtney Mill Company for about \$500 and issued an order permitting the foreclosing. The case is one of the many growing out of the bankruptcy of the promoters of the mill project. Mr. Dow furnished lime and cement and was never paid. He sued for it as a preferred claim and Judge Hamilton held that the lien was prior to the mortgage for \$20,000 given by the company to W. F. Matthews, the present assignee, but which is now held by Waldemar Seton of Portland. Clarke, Blake and Liljeqvist represented Mr. Dow in the suit.
