THE DOMESTIC SCIENCE SCHOOLS

It was only recently that we addressed the public on the need of domestic science training in the schools, and of a special domestic school for the preparation of young women who actually preferred to enter house service, instead of factory or shop service, but they were intelligent enough to know that house service had become a profession to such an extent that to avoid being merely a drudge woman must know her business.

In the cities of the West, as well as of the East, there has been a dearth of household service for several years. This increased in the West especially as prosperity increased, for young women remained at home when their fathers were able to command such day wages as would support an entire family in comfort.

With a possibility of exact preparation, so that a housekeeper can know what she is receiving and the house attendant can know exactly what she is to render, there must come a different conception of work in the house, a different attitude toward it. The point is to remove from house service all that harks back to slavery, to bondage, and give it recognizable standing.
