Coming For Lumber.—The steam schooner Grace Dollar will be here again this week to take a load of lumber from the C. A. Smith mill.

Will Entertain.—The members of the Millcoma Club are arranging for a Christmas entertainment to be held on the evening of December 22. Lady friends will be invited. There will be a musical program and reception.

Siglin Foreman.—Taylor Siglin was chosen foreman of the grand jury now in session at Coquille. There are not many cases to be investigated by the grand jury at this term of court.

Club Meets.—The members of the Chaminade Club held a regular meeting last night at the Finnish hall. At the next meeting the monthly musical program will be given and a concert is to be held probably in January.
