Arrange a Match.—Billy Ross and Gus Ford have arranged for a twenty-round boxing bout to take place in Marshfield Christmas Day.

Buys United Stores.—D. Shaefer of Tacoma, has bought from the referee in bankruptcy the stock of goods in the United Stores on Front street and will take charge at once and sell out the goods.

Sells Laundry.—James Hibbard has sold his interest in the Marshfield Hand and Steam Laundry to G. A. Bonebrake who with Charles Bonebrake will in the future conduct the business.

Here to Inspect.—Capt. Ames and G. Welden, the inspectors of hulls and engines of steamboats, arrived this morning on the Breakwater. They will go to Coquille where they will inspect the hull and engine of the new boat Coquille.

Goes to Gardiner.—The Wilhelmina, which came up from Bandon, will leave tonight or in the morning for Gardiner with a cargo of freight and will bring back 13,000 cases of salmon with other freight.

Big Flight of Ducks.—Claude Nasburg and Russ Tower yesterday killed thirty-two ducks. Two other hunters on North Slough are reported to have killed forty. A heavy gale off the coast and the cold drove the birds into the sheltered inlets.

Will Elect Directors.—A meeting will be held next Monday night to elect directors of the corporation which owns the Millicoma club. Proxies are being secured as it is necessary to have two-thirds of the stock represented in order to have an election of directors.

Sells His Interest.—George H. Westlake has sold his one-third interest in the Oregon Electrical Supply Co. to A. J. Mills, giving the latter a two-third interest while D. D. Dobbins, who conducts the North Bend end of the business, owns a third interest. Mr. Westlake will probably leave the city. His many friends here will regret that he moves from the community.

Was In Wreck.—Dr. Geo. E. Dix, who has just returned from a visit to his old home in Rochester, Minn., was in the marvelous wreck near Blismark, N. D., Dec. 9. It was stated in the press dispatches concerning the wreck that it was one of the most marvelous disasters in railway annals, not a passenger being killed although the train while running fifty miles per hour, was derailed and rolled down a ten-foot embankment. The hard-pressed snow drifts are said to have prevented dozens being killed. Dr. Dix and the rest were badly shaken up but no one was fatally hurt.
