All of the numbers were applauded and the snowball scene was particularly pleasing. The pupils were in costume and some pretty scenic effects were presented.

### Fine Art Work.

The higher grades each held exercises of some kind during the day in their own rooms to observe the closing. All of these rooms were thrown open to the visitors and were handsomely decorated. This work was done by the children and the drawings and painting exhibited would be a revelation to those who have not given close attention to this branch of the school work.

The high school room in charge of Superintendent Golden was decorated with greens and drawings were

exhibited on the black board. The Seventh Grade in Miss Bennett's room had a fine big Christmas tree and the pupils had covered the blackboard with pictures of Santa Claus and other Christmas figures done in colored crayons.

The Fifth Grade in Miss Landreth's room also had a tree and wall decorations and some exceptionally fine specimens of water colors. Little paintings of flowers and figures were made by the pupils in the most artistic manner.

The pupils of the Eighth Grade in Miss Lyon's room, followed a similar plan and made many beautiful pictures and calendars. A handsome water color of a flower was made as a gift to each teacher in the building and the pupils each painted a picture for another pupil in the room. The program of the exercises was carefully written out by the pupils and bound in handsome hand painted covers and given as souvenirs.

In Mrs. D. L. Rood's Sixth Grade room there was as well as a Christmas tree and black board drawings a striking display of the pupils free hand drawing and hand painting. The pupils were particularly proud of a big drawing of a modern Santa Claus arriving in an automobile.

All of the art work by the higher grades is exceptionally fine and illustrates not only the talent of most of the pupils but the valuable training which they are receiving in this line.

The pupils of Miss Eddy's room, and the other lower grades which took part in the entertainment, all had decorations and trees. Small presents were given out to the children so that altogether they had a fine time and none of the school children, even aside from the two weeks of vacation ahead of them, have any reason to complain of not having had any Christmas this year.

### Opens In January.

The next term opens the first Monday in January. It is expected that the new building will be ready by that time. If the equipment arrives and is in place the pupils will be divided but if not the school will open again in the present building and the division made later.
