MANY INJURED BY COLLAPSE OF ROOM IN COURTHOUSE IN MARYLAND TODAY.

 BALTIMORE, Dec. 29.—The second floor of a two-story building in Elliott City, Md., fell today during a hearing before Justice Wellenhorst of William Haggood, a negro, charged with murderous assault. Over a dozen persons suffered broken legs and arms. Among them were: Justice Wellenhorst, the prisoner, ex-Judge J. T. Rogers, State Attorney Martin Brock, Col. Wm. S. Powell, Wm. Hall and Charles Jones, a reporter for the United Press. The trial had just commenced when the floor collapsed.
