# PASSES AWAY GIVES NEW HOPE

Jacob Mayer, Prominent Mason and Business Man, Dies of Old Age Today.

PORTLAND, Dec. 31, - Jacob Mayer, a pioneer of Portland since 1857 and a member of the wholesale drygoods firm of Fleischner Mayer & Company of this city, the largest wholesale house on the Pacific coast with branches at Spokane and Seattle, died today of old age. He was one of the best known Masons in the United States and the oldest on the Pacific coast. He was the Pacific coast representative to the Grand Lodge in England, and was appointed to that honorable position by King Edward of England, when the king was Prince of Wales.
