Marshfield Sails.—The steam schooner Marshfield which has been loading at the C. A. Smith mill, went down to the lower bay today and will sail soon for Bay Point.

To Erect Signal Tower.—The Marshfield city council has given its consent to the government to use a street on Knob Hill as a site for the weather signal tower which is to be installed here. The tower will be of steel construction, 50 feet high and located at point where it will be in easy view from practically all parts of the bay east of the peninsula. The material is now here and it will be erected at once. Otto Schetter has been selected to take care of the signals.

New Charter Progressing.—The committees working on the draft for the new charter for Marshfield will meet this evening to discuss the work. Some portions of the charter are nearing completion. One of the features of the new charter will be that it will provide for a board of public works which will take charge of the street work, sewer construction, etc., relieving the council of practically all kinds of public improvements. The charter will probably be ready for submission to the people within a couple of months.

UPHOLDS HARD FOUGHT CASE

Judge Wolvelton's Decision In Local Suit Is Received Here.

Judge C. A. Schilbrede, referee in bankruptcy, has just been notified that Judge Wolvelton has affirmed his decision in the bankruptcy case of Smith and Duttie.

This case was hotly contested and caused considerable comment at the time it was tried before Judge Schilbrede in this city. We present an outline of the facts in the case as follows:

On the 17th of September 1908, J. W. Umstadt commenced a suit in Justice Pennock's court against Smith and Duttie, proprietors of the Melrose restaurant in this city to recover the sum of \$104.84, and on the following day obtained an attachment and attached the fixtures in the Melrose restaurant, and on the 30th day of September judgment was rendered in the case against Smith and Duttie, and the attached property ordered sold by Justice Pennock.

On the 9th day of October, 1908, Smith and Duttie on their own voluntary application were adjudged bankrupts by Judge Wolvelton of the United States district court.

On the 15th day of October, 1908, the said attached property was sold by Constable Carter in the Umstadt case which was bought in by the plaintiff J. W. Umstadt, who on the following day sold the same to H. A. Wells.

On the 16th day of October, 1908, Judge Schilbrede as referee in bankruptcy, appointed D. W. Small special trustee, and directed him to at once to take possession of all of the property of the bankrupts including the property sold by Constable Carter on execution to J. W. Umstadt.

On the 19th day of October, 1908, H. A. Wells, claiming to be the owner of the Melrose property by his attorneys, Judge Watkins and C. F. McKnight, filed with Judge Schilbrede a motion asking that D. W. Small, the trustee be directed to deliver up to him the possession of the property in question. At the hearing, Mr. Small, the trustee, was represented by Clark, Blake and Liljeqvist, and resisted the motion, the hearing lasted nearly a week. Judge Schilbrede after having had the matter under consideration for several days, denied the motion and upheld Mr. Small in his possession, holding that under the bankruptcy law all attachments and judgments obtained motion for months immediately preceding the date of the adjudication of the debtor as a bankrupt, are null and void, and that the sale of the property by Carter was invalid and passed no title, and that the property still belongs to the bankrupt's estate, and is properly in the possession of the trustee.

From this decision Wells by his Attorneys Watkins and McKnight, took a review to Judge Wolvelton of the United States district court for Oregon, who has now handed down his decision in the case, sustaining Judge Schilbrede in his view of the law and affirming his decision.
