Plans Minstrel Show.—Wm. Dungan and others are planning to put on a home talent minstrel show in Marshfield soon. The personnel of the troupe has not been given out.

Coquille Is Up.—F. S. Dow returned last night from Coquille and says that the Coquille river is up considerably as a result of the freshet. It is not out of its banks in many places yet and consequently is not causing any damage.

Logs For Mill.—There are about 1,500 logs in the Cedar Point boom for the North Bend mill which are being brought over. These logs with others to be brought down will be ample to keep the mill busy practically continuously henceforth.

Station at Bandon.—The United Wireless Telegraph Company is figuring on putting in a station at Bandon. O. P. Hopson and other representatives of the company have gone there with a view of selling some stock to Bandon citizens.

Improve Catching Inlet.—Capt. Harris and other residents of Sumner have petitioned the County court to make an appropriation for improving the upper channel of Catching Inlet. The board has practically agreed to give a dollar for every dollar that the interested citizens raise for the improvement. It is planned to dredge the channel so that scows with lumber and freight can be hauled to Sumner at high tide.

Grimes On Committee.—Inadvertently, the name of Col. Wm. Grimes was omitted from the committee to arrange for naming and numbering the streets of Marshfield in The Times yesterday. As the committee named is an active one, it is believed that they will solve the question so that a system can be adopted at once. The streets should be systematically named and numbered as a necessity, especially in view of the effort being made to secure free mail delivery. Undoubtedly the committee will agree upon a plan so that definite action can be taken at the meeting of the council next Tuesday night.
