Nann Smith In.—The Nann Smith arrived from Bay Point late Saturday and is now loading at the C. A. Smith mill. General Manager J. E. Oren and wife returned on it after a short visit at San Francisco.

Council Tuesday.—The Marshfield city council will meet Tuesday evening to take up a number of matters. The ordinance regulating moving picture shows, providing for an electrical inspector and street matters will come up, probably.

Begin Street Work.—Masters & McLain this morning began the construction of the elevated plank roadway on Broadway south from 'C' street. It is their intention to build the east half of the street first. After the plank work is completed, it is likely that the street will be filled by the dredge.

Pear Tree Blossoms.—Dr. J. T. McCormac has a pear tree on his land near the Eagle Point boom that is evidently a freak in horticulture. For many seasons, it has budded out about this time of the year which of course is too early to allow it to bear fruit. The cold weather didn't seem to affect it this year and it is in bud as usual.

New Town In Curry.—Report has it that several ranches in the vicinity of Denmark have been purchased by Portland parties, who will consolidate them, lay off a townsite, and cut the balance up into small ranches for colonists, and plant them to fruits. Should the move prove successful it will be a great help in drawing the attention of the outside world to the advantages and possibilities of Curry county.—Gold Beach Globe.

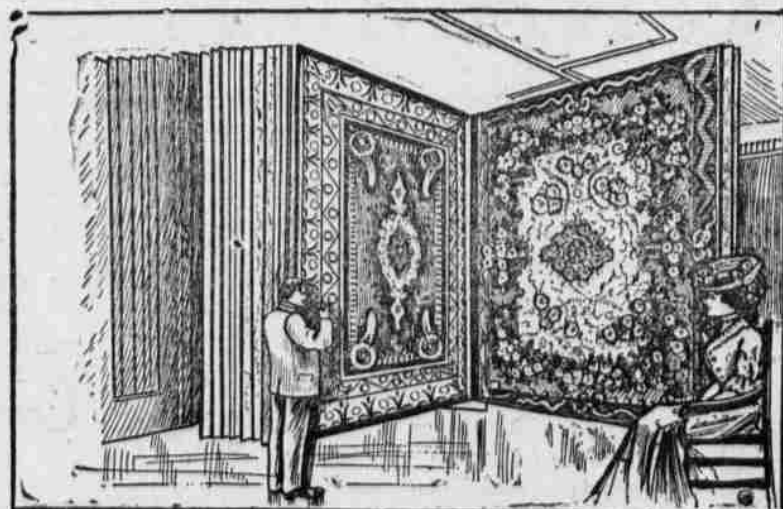
