REV. BENSGTON GETS SAD NEWS

Daughter Dies Very Suddenly While On Way to Hospital.

Rev. Bengtson received the sad news of the death of his daughter, Anna Eleanor Root, who passed to her heavenly home at New Rockford, North Dakota, January 7, 1909, at the age of 21 years, 8 months and 18 days.

The news of her demise came as a great shock to relatives and friends on Coos Bay as the first intimation of her serious illness came in the form of delayed telegrams which brought also the news of her untimely death. She lived at the family home in Marshfield until May 1905, when she left to visit her former home in Minnesota and Illinois. Two weeks ago Rev. Bengtson received a letter stating that she was ailing but there was no suggestion that she was critically ill. Later it was thought necessary to take her from Cheyenne, North Dakota, where she was visiting, to a Minneapolis hospital for an operation. She became very ill and weak on the train and at New Rockford it was found necessary to remove her from the car because of her exhaustion. A short time after she passed away. Telegrams were sent promptly, but the wires being down they did not reach Marshfield until yesterday.

The remains will be taken to Providence, Minnesota, for interment, and laid to rest beside her mother in the place where she was born.

During her stay in Marshfield she made many friends who will learn with deep regret of her untimely death. To the grief stricken relatives the heartfelt sympathy of all their friends will be extended in their hour of affliction.

PROPOSED CHANGES IN OREGON GAME LAWS

Closed Season For Female Pheasants Urged, Also Bounties on Skunks, Crows and Other Pests.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 12.—The following proposed game legislation was adopted by the Oregon Game and Fish Association in session here today:

Bounties.—Bounties shall be offered for scalps of mountain lions, cougars, wild cats, wolves, coyotes and skunks, as well as crows. Bounty on animals to be \$5 and crows 5 cents.

The reason for a bounty on crows is that these fowls prey upon the eggs of the pheasants and quail and injure the young birds.

Duck Season.—September 1 to December 1. Limit 50 birds one day or week, and no sale to markets.

Pheasants.—Open September 1 to December 1. Limit, ten birds one day or week. No shooting of female pheasants to be permitted, and sale prohibited entirely.

Quail.—Open season same as pheasants. Limit ten birds, and no sale.

Fishing.—Same as now, but more specific, defining the length of the season, as well as limiting catches and imposing penalties. The law is made to read so that it includes all the streams within the State of Oregon, whether they have outlet in this commonwealth or not. It will also provide for the permitting of fishing up to within 200 yards of a falls or fish ladder.

ENDS BALKANS WAR.

Turkey and Austria Settle Recent Strife.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 12.—Turkish government has accepted the Austro-Hungarian offer of \$10,800,000 indemnity for the annexation of Bosnia and Herzegovina, thus removing the possible war.
