**Hurt at Mill.**—A. Peterson, of South Marshfield, was quite badly hurt at the C. A. Smith mill the other night. He was working on a new tramway and it collapsed, throwing him thirty feet to the ground. One of the timbers also fell on him. His condition is said to be serious.

**Are Taking Census.**—Marshfield Elks are taking a census of the city to ascertain if there is a population of 5,000 here, the number required before a charter will be issued for a B. P. O. E. lodge in a town. It is expected that the canvass will be completed in a day or two, the city having been divided into districts and enumerators assigned to each district.

**New Cooston School.**—The new school building at Cooston has just been completed and will soon be taken into use. The structure is 54x26 in size, 2 stories in height, surmounted by a tower, and is one of the prettiest school buildings in the country. H. R. Masales and A. H. Eddy, of Marshfield, were the builders.

**Bar Association Banquet.**—Messrs. J. W. Snover, L. A. He was bound over to the grand jury and his bond fixed at \$500. Unless he furnishes bail today, he will be taken to the county jail at Coquille by Sheriff Gage. Anderson says he is innocent and that he would have returned from Bondon of his own accord in a day or two.
