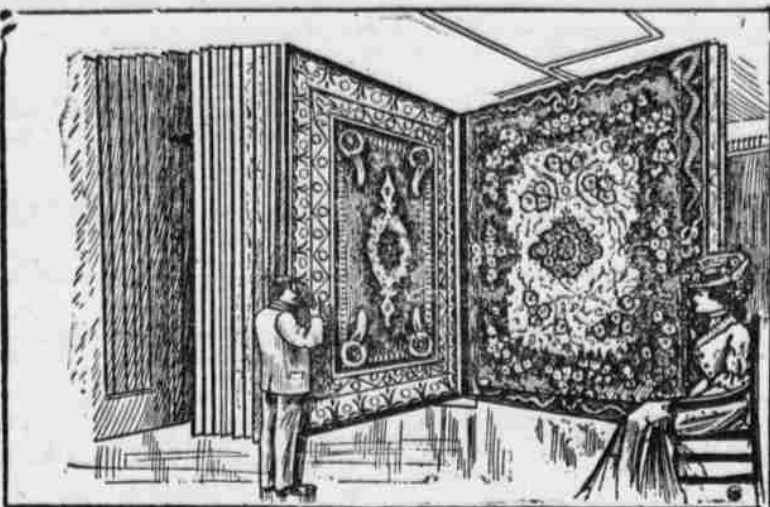

Mr. Sandberg being an employee, had to do as the council wished. I am merely calling attention to this in order to secure fair play all around."
