THE MILITARY ESTABLISHMENT

AS SOON AS congress can get its difficulty with the president adjusted it will be brought face to face with the growing deficit in the public treasury, which Secretary Cortelyou estimates at \$114,000,000 for the present year and at \$143,000,000 for 1910.

Already the suggestion is made in banking circles that a bond issue is demanded. Bond issues have never been popular with the tax paying public and have never been resorted to by any administration excepting in the most extreme circumstances.

It is well to realize, before the country goes any farther in a jingo policy, exactly what is causing the present unfavorable treasury balance. It is well stated in the following paragraph from the Washington correspondence of the Boston Transcript:

"The navy has almost quadrupled its cost in twelve years. In 1908 it cost the country for navy maintenance twice the naval expenses of the Spanish war. The \$118,000,000 spent for the navy was equal to the cost of the navy for the first three years of the civil war, and was only four millions and a half less than the government was spending on the navy in 1865, when all civil war expenses reached their climax. About 50 cents out of every dollar expended by the United States government for everything outside the public debt in 1908 went for the army and the navy."

In other words, if the present naval policy is continued and if the army enlargements such as Captain Hull contemplate are made the country must enlarge its public debt by hundreds of millions or resort to some new form of public taxation.

It may be admitted that this is what European governments have done and are doing. But to this time Americans have pointed at the exactions of the military establishment on the workers of Europe as a condemnation of the whole military style of government. It may be that conditions have changed and that the time has come for the United States to emulate the example of military Europe. But before we accept the conclusion too quickly and begin issuing an enormous public debt it is worth while to think seriously about it.

The United States now has the largest navy but one in the world, and by many regarded as the most efficient navy in the world. And yet we have barely begun if the programme of the military contingent is to be followed out. Of the last congress President Roosevelt demanded four battleships and even the peaceable and mildest of senators were persuaded to suggest the desirability of two. What view Judge Taft will take remains to be seen. But if he insists on a steady development of the navy above its present efficiency it will mean millions upon millions for military expenditure as the permanent policy of the country.

The problem is now before congress but when new taxes are imposed it will be before the people. How far does Oregon for instance, propose to go in encouraging a policy of permanent and growing bonded indebtedness to further enlarge the navy and army?
