Our Wonderful Railroads.

Gail Hamilton was right when she said that if there were never to be any railroads on this continent it would have been an impertinence for Columbus to have discovered it. Only by the railroads could its magnificent distances be bridged. Equally correct was Charles Carroll of Carrollton, the last survivor of the signers of the Declaration of Independence, when, on throwing up the first shovel of earth for the first railway of the United States which was intended to carry passengers and freight, the Baltimore and Ohio, he exclaimed, "I consider this event second only to that of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence, if second even to that." That was in 1828. But England was far ahead of us in railway building in the beginning. Even Russia got a better start than we did. At the outset we imported not only our locomotives and cars, but also the rails on which they were run and the men to run them. However, John Stevens, Peter Cooper, Evan Thomas, Matthias Baldwin and others changed all this and in their various fields laid the foundations of a railway system which is today in dimensions and completeness far ahead of that of any other half a dozen countries in the world combined.—Leslie's Weekly.

The Franz Hals Museum in Holland.

Old Haarlem calls up the shadow of Franz Hals. The museum is verily a sanctuary to his memory. There the famous corporation pictures hang. One sees the members of the various guilds in the fullness of careless life, eating, drinking and merrymaking. Here Hals is seen at the height of his power. The splendid color and directness of work are a revelation. Every figure seems alive, and one is convinced they were all in the flesh once. This great master with one bold stroke of his brush made these men immortal. At eighty years he still painted, and his last picture hangs beside his masterpieces. Hals and Hals will be associated as long as the place lasts. One marvels at the execution of the Dutch painters, whether it be in the broad work of Hals or in the miniature finish of the genre masters. All of them had a splendid sense of values, atmosphere and human life; a perfect harmony of relation fills their canvases.—Springfield (Mass.) Republican.

Unconquerable.

It was a veteran soldiery that re-peopled the plantations and the homesteads of the south, writes Thomas Nelson Page in the Old Dominion, and withstood the forces thrown against them during the period of reconstruction. In addition to personal pride, self reliance and physical courage, they possessed also race pride, which is inestimable in a great popular struggle.

However beaten and broken they were, the people came out of the war with their spirit unquenched and a belief that they were unconquerable.

Cold and a Candle.

Dr. Moss of the English polar expedition of 1875 and 1876, among other odd things, tells of the effect of cold on a wax candle which he burned. The temperature was 35 degrees below zero, and the doctor must have been considerably discouraged when, upon looking at his candle, he discovered that the flame had all it could do to keep warm. It was so cold that the flame could not melt all the wax of the candle, but was forced to eat its way down the candle, leaving a sort of skeleton of the candle standing. There was heat enough, however, to melt oddly shaped holes in the thin walls of wax, and the result was a beautiful lacelike cylinder of white, with a tongue of yellow flame burning inside of it and sending out into the darkness many streaks of light.

Siege of Crete.

Crete can claim to have been the scene of one of the longest sieges on record, longer than the siege of Troy, for in the seventeenth century it took the Turks more than twenty years to capture its capital city. The island, in fact, is famous for protracted military operations, for, though the revolution of 1821 was speedily successful in the open country, the fortified towns were still uncaptured when the powers intervened in 1830.

URGES CHANGES IN GAME LAWS

Closed Season 10 Years for Elk and Imprisonment For All Persons Violating the Laws.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 23. — In his annual report for the year 1908, State Game Warden R. O. Stevenson shows that convictions during that period brought \$3,000 to the state in fines. The following recommendations are appended to the report:

1. Enact a law fixing the open season for deer between the dates of August 15 and October 15 with three deer in any one open season as the killing limit.

2. Fix the open season for ducks between the date of October 15 and March 1, and place 25 ducks as the maximum killing limit for any one week.

3. The open season for upland birds should commence October 15 and close November 15, with six birds in any one day or 12 in any one week as the maximum killing limit.

4. During the last 15 days of the open upland bird season the killing of Chinese pheasant hens should be absolutely prohibited.

5. Fish should have more protection than a closed season for six months in each year, as must be apparent from the number of streams, once excellent fishing ground, that are now almost barren of fish. I would also reduce the maximum limit of one day's catch of trout to 50.

6. Provide all fishing streams in which dams are maintained for any purpose, with adequate facilities to enable unobstructed passage of fish for spawning purposes. My observation leads me to recommend the circular ladder as the best device.

7. The law against hunting with dogs is in a most unsatisfactory state and I urgently recommend the passage of an act that will effectively restrain the running of deer with dogs and yet contain provisions affording stockmen the privilege of hunting animals that prey upon their flocks.

8. Elk, mountain sheep, and antelope should have the protection of a closed season for at least ten years, for it is certainly a fact as will be attested by all sportsmen, that these magnificent specimens of our big game are threatened with sudden extinction. In order to make this protection effective I beg to offer the suggestion that the violation of such a law should be made punishable by imprisonment in the penitentiary.

9. For the convenience of hunters residing in parts remote from the county seats, and as a means whereof I am persuaded that our game revenue would be largely increased, I earnestly recommend the enactment of a law extending the power to issue hunters' licenses to the State Game Warden and all his deputies, and to all justices of the peace.

10. I would recommend that a law be enacted placing a bounty upon cougar, bob-cats, coyotes and black and gray wolves. In order to equitably adjust the burdens of the bounty law and obviate abuses thereunder, I would suggest that provision be made for payment of one-half the bounty by the state and the other half by the county in which the animal may be killed.

12. I urge that memorial be addressed to Congress asking for the enactment of a law setting aside forest reserves as a permanent breeding ground for wild game and making it a violation of the federal law for any person to hunt or kill wild game within the boundary of such reserve.
