Plant in Tomorrow.—The M. F. Plant reached San Francisco Friday night, making fairly good time from here despite the storm that prevailed. She sailed from San Francisco for here Sunday and will probably get in tomorrow.

Elijah Smith Ill.—It was reported here today that Elijah Smith, head of the Southern Oregon Company, was critically ill in Portland. The report could not be confirmed here. R. E. Shine was called to Portland a day or so ago.

Seriously Ill.—Mrs. Winifred Gaffey, formerly of this city but at present living in Coquille, is seriously ill at her home there suffering from a paralytic stroke. Rev. Father Curley was summoned there last Saturday. He reports she is improving with hopes of recovery.

Alliance Is Late.—The Alliance, owing to the delays by the ice and wind on her last trip was unable to get away from Portland until last evening, according to a wireless message received from her today by Agent H. W. Skinner. It is expected that she will reach here tomorrow.

Body Not Found.—The search for the body of Carlos Wittick, the North Bend child lost in the bay, continues but without result. More dynamite and blasting powder was used yesterday but it failed to bring the body to light. It is believed that the body was carried away by the tide from where the little chap was drowned.

Dredge Moves.—The dredge Oregon today moved to the Nann Smith slip where it is pumping out the mud in great shape. This is the first time the slip has been unoccupied for some days. As soon as the job is completed, the cutting of the shoal near the Cold Storage plant

Refuses to Eat After the Death of His Master.

MENIMINEE, Mich., Jan. 23.—After two weeks of constant fasting, Buster, a valuable pointer owned by Anton Schammo, who was killed in the woods on Oct. 23, died of grief.

Since the afternoon that Schammo, a well known hunter, was killed by his own weapon and fell beside his faithful dog, the animal refused to be comforted. Each afternoon, just as the sun was setting, the dog trotted to the corner where every day it was in the habit of meeting its master when the latter returned from work. But no food would it touch and no food would it accept, and yesterday morning its gaunt remains, lying upon an old coat its master wore, was discovered in the barn of the Chicago Houses, Schammo's home for years.

FRISCO POLICE HOLD GORDON

Sherman, Clay & Company Agent Wanted Here For Alleged Crime. Under Arrest

Marshal J. W. Carter this morning received a telegram from Chief of Police J. B. Cook of San Francisco, announcing that W. F. Gordon, wanted here on a charge of embezzling the funds of the Sherman, Clay and Company, was under arrest there and would be held awaiting advice from here. In response to a telephone from Mr. Carter, Sheriff Gage came over from Coquille at noon and will arrange to go or send for Gordon at once. Deputy Prosecuting Attorney L. A. Liljeqvist has made the proper requisition blanks for his return.

Mr. Bethel who was sent here by Sherman, Clay and Company of Portland to straighten out matters announces that the charges against Gordon will be pushed to the limit. The exact amount of the alleged embezzlement is not known.

Mrs. Gordon and baby who arrived here from Boise, Idaho, but a few days before Mr. Gordon's sudden departure, reached San Francisco on the M. F. Plant Friday. It is presumed that Gordon was then under arrest or perhaps was captured when he went to meet them. Owing to the telegraph line being down, today was the first opportunity of San Francisco authorities communicating with the local officials.

NEWS OF COQUILLE.

Events of Interest as Told by The Sentinel.

The report reached here that about 800 feet of the new trestle at River-ton was blown down by the high winds of Wednesday evening. No particulars of the accident were obtainable.

WOOD PEGS HELD BRIDGE TOGETHER HALF CENTURY

Structure Now Being Dismantled Had Been in Constant Use for Fifty-Seven Years.

SALT LAKE, Jan. 23.—The old white bridge over the Jordan River is being dismantled.

Built in 1851, four years after the first white settlement of Utah, for twenty-five years it was the only dry crossing of the Jordan. The pony express used it in going to and fro between St. Joe and California, the emigrant trains used it as they entered the last stage of their westward journey, and the Mormon pioneers used it constantly in going to and from the lake. The builders of the bridge had neither nails, rivets nor iron bolts, but used wooden pegs for fastenings to such good advantage that the structure has been in constant service for more than fifty years.

POTATOES AND ONIONS UP ON MANIPULATION

The Portland Journal says: "Potato and onion prices went to a higher point during the past week because of manipulation."

"There was no greater demand for either product—in fact no shipping could be done in either line but the Front street trade put up the price because it could.
