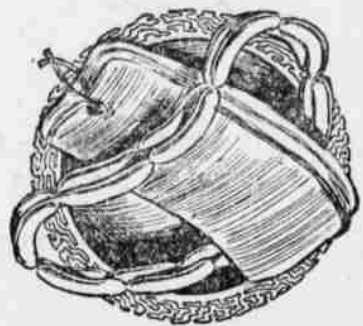

one days from San Pedro for Coos
Bay and no word has been heard
from her. A new captain is in com-
mand and much anxiety is felt con-
cerning the craft. She was built on
Coos Bay.

Lawyers Here.—The Coos County
Bar Association is holding a meeting
at the I. O. O. F. Hall this afternoon
and a majority of the attorneys in
the county are in attendance. To-
night, the visiting legal lights will
be entertained at a banquet in the
I. O. O. F. Hall by the Marshfield
attorneys.

Miss McLain Chosen.—Miss Mc-
Lain, a sister-in-law of Duncan Fer-
guson, has been elected principal of
the Eastside schools. The schools
which have been closed for a few
weeks owing to the inability to se-
cure a successor to Mrs. Bevier re-
sumed yesterday. Miss Franse re-
mains as a teacher there.

Engine Breaks Down.—As a result
of an accident, the side rods of the
engine on the train broke over in
the valley today, damaging the loco-
motive so badly that another engine
had to be sent from here to bring
the noon train over. In consequence,
the train was a couple of hours late.
The engineer and fireman luckily
escaped injury.

Council Tonight.—The Marshfield
city council will meet this evening
to take up the sewer question and
also the new salary ordinance. The
sewer question is an important one
now as it will be necessary to put
in the sewers before the proposed
permanent street improvements are
made. To put in the sewer, a bond
issue will have to be floated.

Oppose Port Bill.—According to a
story in the Portland Journal, Port-
land men are now fighting the port
bill in which Coos Bay is interested
as it will afford a means of system-
atic improvement of the smaller har-
bors because the Rose City interests
think it would give Astoria an ad-
vantage over them. Whether the
bill can be passed above Portland's
opposition is doubtful.

TRIBUTE TO THE DIRECTOR

Words of Deserved Praise For
Moving Spirit of Chami-
nade Club.

In as much as several articles
have appeared in The Times lately,
lauding that most laudable institu-
tion, The Chaminade Club, and a
number of equally laudable artists
booked to appear at the approaching
concert, it has occurred to an inter-
ested observer who will subscribe
himself as "An Outsider" that some-
thing has been very conspicuous by
its absence; an omission which gives
to the entire affair the nature of
the play "Hamlet" with the char-
acter Hamlet left out; and that is
some reference to the leading spirit
in this enterprise so important to
the musical life of the community.

Of course everybody knows that
the person referred to is the director
of the club, Mrs. Wm. Horsfall, Jr.
Although her name has hardly been
mentioned once on the placards or
in any public mention of the club or
concert, the enthusiastic loyalty and
admiration of both active and asso-
ciate members have been the best
medium of establishing her in the
minds of everybody as the one per-
son to whom we are indebted for the
club in its present flourishing condi-
tion.

It has been said that "A prophet is
not without honor, save in his own
country, and among his own kind-
red," and a musical writer has ex-
pressed the same idea when he said
that "A musician seldom out-grows
being considered an amateur until
after he leaves his home town."

But Mrs. Horsfall is one of the
few exceptions to this proverb.

As a pianist, she has reached a
point where she compels universal
acknowledgement of her artistic
ability. As a director she so com-
bines grace and effectiveness that it
is a pleasure to sing under her ba-
ton. Last, but not least, her ability
as an organizer and manager is the
one thing that is making the Chami-
nade Club the pace-maker on musical
matters in this locality. The above
are a few impressions that your
oracle has gleaned here and there
and he only wishes to add that,
judging from the business like way
in which it is run, and the elements
of which it is made up, very little
will be done in this neck of the woods
in the future without taking into
consideration the opinion of the
Chaminade Club, and its peerless
director.
