DR. JEKYLL AND MR. HYDE

Keane's Stock Company in
Famous Play at Masonic
Saturday Night.

Roberts Louis Stevenson's great
novel of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde
has been more widely read than per-
haps any other work of the century.
It is little wonder the play taken from
this great book should have imme-
diately created such a sensation
