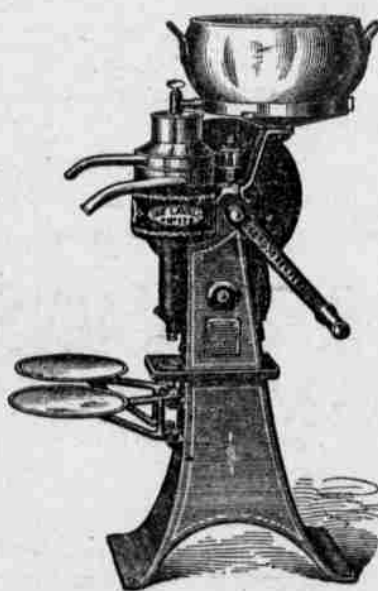

HOLD CHARTER ELECTION.

Myrtle Point to Arrange For Waterworks System.

The Myrtle Point Enterprise says: "A week from Monday the legal voters of Myrtle Point will be expected to pass upon the question of amending the city charter so that the limit for waterworks indebtedness may be increased. The situation might be likened to the man who had what he considered a good pair of shoes that only needed resoling. He had not much more than had them soled when the uppers gave out and he was compelled to have new uppers put on to save what he invested in soles. Myrtle Point has a portion of a fairly good water system, but it is valueless unless iron pipe is put in for mains. It is either rebuild a portion of the system or do without waterworks, and it is believed that a majority of the taxpayers will not consent to a backward step after it has been proven that the first step in advance was not far enough or not in the right direction."

Reeves Bound Over.—Richard J. Reeves was yesterday bound over to keep the peace under a \$250 bond. The action was taken by Justice Pennock after hearing considerable evidence on the charges preferred by Chas. Prescott. Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Liljeqvist, while the latter was testifying, and Mr. Reeves had several tilts that afforded considerable amusement for the crowd that congregated in the court room.

DENEEN SAVES LIFE OF MURDERER BILLEK

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Jan. 28. — Governor Deneen commuted to life imprisonment the sentence of death upon Herman Billek, the alleged murderer of Mary Vrzal.

The legal battle of Herman Billek to escape the sentence of death imposed upon him on July 18, 1907, is without parallel in the criminal records of Illinois. Six times Billek was granted respites of stays of executions, the reprieves coming twice within four days of the dates set for his execution, and once when the death march to the scaffold was about to start.

The crime for which Billek was convicted was the poisoning of 22-year-old Mary Vrzal. Indictments accusing him of causing the deaths of six members of the Vrzal family had been returned and he was convicted on the first of the charges. The motive alleged for the crimes was to secure life insurance.

BREAKWATER TO SAIL.

Will Leave Portland For Coos Bay Monday Evening.

The Breakwater will sail from Portland for Coos Bay Monday night, according to advices received by Agent W. F. Miller from Capt. Magenn today. When the vessel was got into the dry dock at Portland, it was found that her rudder stock had been only slightly twisted instead of being badly damaged. It is expected that the Breakwater will get in here Wednesday and will sail Thursday for Portland. She will proceed to make up lost time and get back on her old schedule in about two weeks.

CITIZENS LEAGUE MEETS.

Urge Sinking Fund Be Provided—May Get After Lockhart.

At a meeting of the Citizens' League last evening, several advocated that the city officials be compelled to start a sinking fund to take up the old warrants and if this is not feasible now, they declared that instead of diverting the money into special funds and paying out cash now, the old warrants ought to be paid first. No definite action was taken. Street matters were also taken up. There was a division of opinion as to whether it was a wise thing for the city to go to the expense of fighting the 'B' street opening case like the council has decided to do.

Henry Sengstacken suggested that it would be a good thing for the city to compel Councilman Lockhart to move his building off the two feet of the city lot between Front street and the wharf at 'A' street or to compel him to pay rental for it. This will probably be brought up at an early session of the city council. In this connection, it was found that while the city of Marshfield owns the lot in question, it has never been dedicated to the public as a street.

The sewer question was discussed and the general opinion was that a gravity system should be put in. I. S. Smith urged that other cities similar to Marshfield be communicated with before the sewer question is decided.

It was decided to hold meetings the second and fourth Friday evenings of each month.

GET MOTOR LIFE BOAT.

Coos Bay Life Saving Station to Be Given Craft.

Capt. Nelson, formerly in charge of the Coos Bay Life Saving Station, but now in charge of the San Francisco station, has written to friends here that a first-class thirty-four-foot motor life boat is to be supplied to the life-saving station here in the near future. Capt. Nelson says it will be big benefit to the local station and probably the news of its allowance will be a surprise to the local boys. He says he is getting along nicely and sends his regards to his friends here.
