Change Harbor Lights.—Numerous changes are being made in the harbor lights of the Coos Bay channel. All of the lights on the west side of the Bay are to be moved nearer the shore, it is said.

Plant In 'Frisco.—A wire from F. S. Dow announces that the M. F. Plant reached 'Frisco yesterday morning after a rather rough trip down. She will sail from there Saturday evening for Coos Bay.

Columbine In.—The Columbine arrived in North Bend today with the apparatus for the new fog signal station for Coos Bay. The Columbine is in the U. S. Light House service and came from Portland.

Wasp In.—The Wasp, a steam schooner, reached here from the South today and will load with lumber at the C. A. Smith mill for Bay Point. It is stated that the January shipments from the Smith mill totalled 7,500,000 feet and 1,138,000 lath.

Marshfield Case Up.—The case of the City of Marshfield vs. the E. B. Dean Lumber Company and the O. A. Smith Lumber Company, involving the condemnation of the lot at the foot of 'B' street, is on the calendar to come in the federal court at Portland today. The trial will probably last several days.

May Change Prices.—Proprietors of local barber shops are discussing the advisability of adopting a new schedule of prices. Many are opposed to it but others favor it. The proposed schedule is said to reduce shaves from 25 to 15 cents and raise hair cuts from 25 to 35 cents and to make charges for hot towels, neck-shaves, etc., which are now included in the two-bit shave.

To Plant Oysters.—State Biologist A. R. Swetser in a letter to Dr. J. T. McCormac, president of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce, says he is planning to continue the experiments of planting native oyster beds here if the state legislature makes an appropriation for the work. It is believed that the appropriation bill will go through and Senator Chase and Representatives 'Bedillion Muncy will probably be asked to lend their aid.

To Prosecute Gordon Case.—Manager Johnson of the Sherman, Clay Piano Company is expected here from Portland today or tomorrow to prosecute the action against W. F. Gordon, the former agent here, who is accused of embezzlement. Marshal Carter said today that he had not received any official from Sheriff Gage as to what the developments in California are in the fight Gordon is making against his extradition to Oregon. The San Francisco Examiner says that the 'Frisco Aerie of Eagles engaged legal talent for Gordon and that he was freed on a writ of habeas corpus and that Gordon claims the charges against him here were the result of a mistake in bookkeeping.

NOTED CASE DECIDED.

Initiative and Referendum Upheld by Supreme Court.

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 5.—In an opinion written by Justice Bean, the Supreme Court affirmed the decree of Judge Cleland, of the Circuit Court for Multnomah county, in the state, respondent, against the Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph Company, in which the constitutionality of the initiative and referendum amendment, adopted by the legislature in 1903, and by the people in 1906, is upheld, and the company is required to pay the annual license of 2 per cent upon its gross receipts and to make annual statements to the State Treasurer. The case will probably be appealed to the United States Supreme Court.

day of his birth and make it a state holiday."

Ten New Bills Introduced.

New bills were introduced as follows:

H. B. 246, McArthur, creating a board of higher curricula, to be composed of five members, and be appointed by the governor, with the consent of the Senate, by the first Monday in July this year, the State School Superintendent to act as secretary. The duties of the board members shall be to guard against duplication of courses in the higher institutions of education, and they shall serve without salary, but have expenses.

H. B. 247, Bean, relating to acquiring title to realty by adverse use thereof.

H. B. 248, Barrett, creating diking districts and providing for the building of dikes and dams.

H. B. 249, Conyers, authorizing the State Land Board to repurchase lands in school section within the National forest reserves, and providing for the use of state lands as basis for indemnity school selections.

H. B. 250, Abbott, amending the corrupt practice act so as to commingle amounts received by the state in accordance with its provision with the printing fund.

H. B. 251, Abbott—Providing that none of the funds of the University of Oregon shall be expended except there be an appropriation by law.

To Protect Crabs.

H. B. 252, Bedillion—For the protection of salt crabs in Coos county.

H. B. 253, Jones (Clackamas) — Making the dentistry law more specific and rigid.

H. B. 254, Jones (Clackamas) — Raising the dental license fee from \$10 to \$25.

H. B. 255, Brandon—Providing for viewing and laying out county roads on the best course possible.

H. J. R. 13, Hughes, and H. J. R. 14, Jaeger, introduced this morning, provide for an amendment to section 1, article 9, of the constitution, requiring uniform rates of assessment and taxation to be established.

H. C. R. 16, Jaeger, authorizes state officials to enter into a contract with Salem to furnish water to the various state institutions as soon as the projected water system is established by the municipality.

This afternoon the House passed S. B. 13, Nottingham, permitting registration of voters absent from the state, with slight opposition.
