SCHOOL NEWS OF TWO CITIES

THIS IS A SUGGESTION program for the public schools and literary societies for Oregon day, February 14, the 50th anniversary of the admission of Oregon into the Union. The act admitting Oregon was passed February 12 and signed by the president February 14, 1859. Inasmuch as the 14th falls on Sunday this year, it is suggested that the exercises be held on Friday, February 12, and that the centenary of Lincoln's birth be commemorated in the same exercises.

This program is suggested by the University of Oregon and was prepared by the departments of history and education. Order of exercises. Song—"Oregon," Oregon Teachers' Monthly, September, 1908.

Reading—Jefferson's Instructions to Lewis for the Exploration of the Columbia River (Cones' "The History of the Lewis and Clark Expedition," page 28 from middle of page to end of second line on page 27).

Declamation—Bayliss' speech in congress, justifying the expectation that Oregon would be settled by Americans (annals of 17th congress, second session, 1822-23; selections pages 681 and 682).

Reading—Applegate's "A Day With the Cow Column" (Schaefer's History of the Pacific Northwest, pages 186-192).

Recitation—"Campfires of the Pioneers," Simpson, fifth and sixth stanzas; "Pilgrims of the Plain," Joaquin Miller, third stanza (both in Quarterly Oregon Historical Society, December, 1900).

Reading—"Act for the Admission of Oregon," from report of secretary of state of Oregon, 1897-8, pages 151-2.

Oration—"Abraham Lincoln," by a member of the school or some prominent citizen.

COSTLEST RAILROAD IN AMERICA NEARLY FINISHED

Along One Stretch Men Had to Be Suspended by Ropes Over the Face of Cliffs.

SPOKANE, Wash., Feb. 1.—Regarded by engineers as a marvel of construction is the Spokane, Portland and Seattle Railway, 423 miles, the most direct line between this city and Portland. The road, built jointly by the Great Northern and Northern Pacific systems, is the most expensive in America.

The line will permit of longer trains being hauled over it than any other road in the country. There are no sharp curves, the greatest being three degrees, and as a result one locomotive can pull from Spokane to Portland as many cars as it can start on level ground. This is expected to set new records for heavy loading.

Twenty miles of line between Pasco and Kahlotas cost \$5,000,000, or \$250,000 a mile, while a mile of road along the bluffs overlooking Snake River involve an expenditure of \$500,000. To survey and build this part of the line, which follows the Columbia River, men were suspended over the cliffs with ropes; but while there were many narrow escapes, not a life was lost, nor was any one seriously injured.
