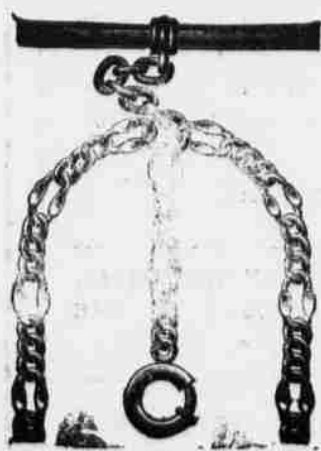

established signals will be given day
and night. Otto Schetter will act in
the capacity of displayman."

BANDON LOSES BIG BULKHEAD

About Eighty-Five Feet of Re-
cent Improvement Is
Washed Out.

BANDON, Ore., Feb. 8.—The Re-
corder says: "What was thought to
be a substantial bulkhead on the
north bank of the Coquille river at
this place, and which was completed
only last week has proven insuf-
ficient, and on Saturday morning
about five o'clock eighty-five feet of
it was washed out. There is only
one safe way of protecting that side
of the river and that is to erect a
cement bulkhead, and the sooner
Uncle Sam gets busy with this pro-
ject, the cheaper it will be for him.
There is great need of a substantial
bulkhead on that side of the river
and it is up to the proper authori-
ties to build it.

"The sand has been washing away
on the north side of the Coquille river
until it has now commenced to
undermine the porch of the residence
of the lighthouse keepers, but there
is an eleven foot concrete basement
under the house so that it is not
considered to be in immediate dan-
ger, but will not last long unless
something is done to prevent further
washing. There should be immediate
steps taken toward moving the light-
house to this side of the river and
placing it on the bluff where it can
be seen from the sea."

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—The Sen-
ate passed Senator Fulton's bill ap-
propriating \$175,000 for a site and
public building at Astoria.

BEGIN NEW SUIT.

Second Action By Government Over
Oregon Railway Grant.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 8.—An-
other step in the fight of the Federal
government to recover possession of
the land included in the immense
grant to the Oregon & California
Railroad Company was taken when
B. D. Townsend, special assistant to
the Attorney-General filed in the
Federal Court in Portland 35 suits in
equity against the Oregon & Califor-
nia and Southern Pacific companies
and over 100 other defendants.

These suits are supplementary to
those previously filed against the
Harriman companies and are for the
purpose of recovering land included
in the grant and already sold by the
railroads, or, where title to the land
cannot be regained, of securing for
the government all monies paid for
the land in excess of \$2.50 an acre,
the price at which, it was stipulated
in the original grant the land would
be sold. Besides the railroads, the
defendants in the suits are those
who have purchased land from these
companies. The suits involve more
than \$15,000,000 and also more than
353,288 acres of land. All of the
land is located in Oregon.

It is alleged in the complaint that
all of the lands sold to the defend-
ants named in the suits were sold
in violation of the terms of the land
grant, and for this reason the gov-
ernment hopes to make null and void
the deeds and contracts made by the
Oregon & California Company to the
purchasers.
