BAUMGARTNER RESIGNS.

Local Agent For Alliance Will Go to Seattle.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 8.—F. P. Baumgartner, local agent for the George D. Gray Company, which owns and operates the steamer Alliance between Portland and Coos Bay, has tendered his resignation and will be succeeded by Charles G. Stimpson, of Everett, Wash. Mr. Stimpson arrived from Puget Sound and will take up his new work here today. He has been associated with the same company on the Sound. Mr. Baumgartner has been with the company for the past 11 years. During the gold excitement in the Far North he was a purser on one of the steamers which the concern operated out of Seattle to Alaska. He then came to Portland and induced the company to place the steamer Alliance in the freight and passenger trade between here and Coos Bay. Through his efforts the line was made to pay, although every other steamer which had been placed on the route previously had to be withdrawn for want of patronage. Mr. Baumgartner has a flattering offer to go to Seattle and identify himself with one of the concerns operating a line of steamers to Alaska. He also has under consideration a proposition of remaining at Portland and embarking in business on his own account. "Fred" Baumgartner, as he is called by his intimate acquaintances, is classed among the most popular steamship men in Portland.

CARRANZA IS EASY VICTOR

FLIRTING IN CHURCH ENTIRELY PROPER

CHICAGO, Feb. 8.—While flirting in theatres and other places of amusement should be tabooed, according to Rev. S. B. Baxter of Aurora, he has announced that it may properly take place in churches, where he declares, "It is purged of its harmfulness." His decision grows out of a crusade against Sunday night amusements.

HERMANN IS DETAINED.

Unable to Go to Europe Until Fraud Case Is Tried.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 8.—According to the latest information received from Francis J. Heney relative to the trial of Binger Hermann, under an indictment charging him with land frauds in connection with the Blue Mountain forest reserve case, it is probable that the ex-Congressman will be brought to trial soon after the Calhoun case in San Francisco has been disposed of. John M. Gearin, attorney for Mr. Hermann in the pending case, stated that there was nothing definite to give out in regard to the date of the Hermann trial for the reason that arrangements therefore could not be made until the conclusion of the Calhoun case, it being Mr. Heney's intention to personally conduct the prosecution of both Hermann and ex-Congressman John N. Williamson, who will be tried jointly under the indictment.

Reports were in circulation today that Mr. Hermann had gone to Europe on a pleasure trip, but this was denied by Mr. Gearin, who stated that some weeks ago he received a letter from Hermann, who was then in Washington, D. C., saying some friends wished him to accompany them on a three months' tour abroad, and suggesting that if his trial was not to come up within that time he would like the opportunity of getting away. Mr. Gearin in reply informed his client that it was impossible to say just when the case would be set, and advised him to remain in this country until that question was settled. Since then he has not heard from the former Commissioner of the General Land Office, but is satisfied he is still at the National Capital.

TAX NEVADA BACHELORS.

Woolcock Would Make All Over 28 Pay \$4.50 Yearly.

RENO, Nev., Feb. 8.—Assemblyman Woolcock, of Lander County, today gave notice in the Legislature that he will introduce a bill providing for a tax upon bachelors. The bill will specify that any man who has attained the age of 28 and has not assumed the marriage vow will be subject to a state tax of \$4.50 a year.

The notice was received with some semblance of humor by the House, but Mr. Woolcock insisted that he was in earnest, and that when the bill was introduced it would receive hearty support.

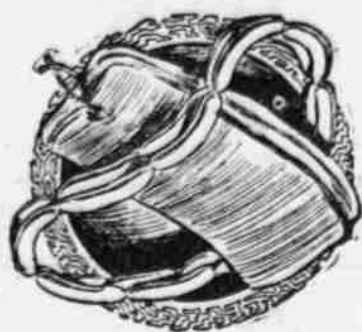
