WASTED WEALTH.

THE INLAND WATERWAYS Commission has performed a great work in combatting the reactionary arguments of Speaker Cannon. After long investigation it has presented an array of figures, every one of which is a brief for the preservation of the forests, the broadening of areas of irrigation and the federal control of power courses.

Of the water which annually flows into the sea only about one per cent is utilized for municipal and community supply. Less than two per cent is used for irrigation purposes. About five per cent is utilized by navigation. Less than five per cent is employed in manufacturing power. It is estimated that 85 per cent to 95 per cent goes to waste in floods and freshets which might be restrained by the protection of forest land along stream courses.

Since 1900 the annual damage from flood has risen from \$45,000,000 to \$233,000,000, and it was during that period that more lumber was cut than in all the years of the republic before. There was an indirect loss through depreciation of property values which was probably far in excess of the traceable damage. There was loss in the impediment of navigation and in soil erosion. Then, too, the tremendous quantities of soil matter carried into the sea blocks harbors and channels, brings troubles to shipping and compels the expenditure of huge sums to keep waterways open. It is the estimate of the commission that soil erosion reduces farm production ten to twenty per cent, making the annual loss to farmers close to \$500,000,000.

This is a tremendous burden of responsibility to rest upon the shoulders of such short-sighted statesmen as Joseph Cannon and his school. It emphasizes the need in this country of a grade of politician that can consider governmental demands in a scientific light, that can be uninfluenced by petty and personal ambitions and prejudices.
