Mr. McCann is trying to make arrangements so that he can personally finance the matter by taking bonds or notes instead of cash in payment for the work.

Schooners Long Overdue.—As yet no word has been received from the Simpson Lumber Company's schooner, the Omega, which is out forty-six days from San Pedro for Coos Bay. The schooner Echo is out thirty days on the canal trip. The trip ought to be made in twenty days and there is considerable misgiving as they are likely to run short of provisions and water. D. D. Campbell who has lived on Coos Bay many years says he never saw so many high tides as this winter and declares that heavy storms at sea must be the cause and he believes this explains the delay of the two schooners.
