as a master plumber.

Allice street was ordered accepted and Masters and McLain ordered paid \$235 on their contract.

Masters and McLain were ordered paid \$500 on their Broadway improvement contract.

Masters and McLain were requested to rush their North Cedar street planking contract to completion and also their Baines street sewer contract. Mr. McLain said that the first would be completed within a few days and the sewer would be started just as soon as the weather would permit.

Contractor Myren was ordered to put more nails in the Graham and Washington street sidewalks which he has built. He was also allowed \$50 additional for some grading he had to do on Washington street that was not covered in his contract. He was ordered paid \$80 on his contract.

Open Flanagan Street.

The old question of opening a highway to the homes of Frank Hall and several others in Southwest Marshfield who have been shut out since the county road was changed was brought up. Ohio street property owners objected to having that street improved at this time. It was finally decided to try and have Flanagan street opened another block which will give them the desired street to the city.

In this connection, it is proposed to have all of Flanagan street south of the bridge planked. Hugh McLain, Dr. Straw and others who own property along it are in favor of paving it planked if it is put through another block to Ohio street, giving Mr. Hall his desired relief.

Prior to the proposal of the plan for opening Flanagan street, there was a rather heated debate in which Mr. Hansen, Mr. Hall, Councilman Coke and Councilman Sacchi participated. Sacchi and Hall being in favor of opening Ohio street and the other two against.

Small Building Up.

Mr. Barrett was again before the council concerning his request for permission to erect a one-story building, 12x12 on the Gulovson property at the southwest corner of 'C' and Broadway. Councilman Savage said the adjoining property owners were opposed to it and that he didn't think permission should be granted for a frame structure there. The other councilman concurred. Mr. Barrett wanted to know if he could build a fire-proof building the same size out of corrugated iron or brick. He was told he would have to get a permit from Building Inspector Turpen and the council. He will take the matter up with Mr. Turpen at once.

To Sell Bonds.

Councilman Sacchi said that steps ought to be taken to dispose of the special improvement bonds ordered sold last fall in order that the contractors could be paid their money. He said it was not right to keep them waiting so long after they had completed their contracts.

Mayor Straw said that this was being done, a local business man having started negotiations to place the entire issue of \$16,000. He said that it looked as though the deal would be consummated within a few days.

FIGHTERS ARE READY TO GO TO THE MAT

Although the date has not yet been set, it is probable that the boxing contest between Lou Carranza and Charlie Jost will be pulled off the first week in March, the contestants having practically agreed upon that time, although no articles have been signed as yet.

J. W. Joseph, manager for Carranza, stated today that he had all preliminary matters arranged and that all that was necessary was for Jost to sign articles. It was thought at first that the mill might be pulled off on Washington's birthday anniversary, February 22, but it is probable now that the fight will take place the first week in March.

In the event that the bout goes through, the fighters will fight at catch weights and the contest will go twenty rounds.

A meeting will be held tonight, when the articles will be signed.

After the bout in Marshfield, Manager Joseph will take his man to Sacramento, where the pugilist is scheduled to meet "Kid" George of Stockton. The fight will take place in Sacramento the first week in March, the date as yet not having been set.

COWBOY WORTH \$50,000 WORKS FOR \$35 A MONTH

ESPUOLA, Tex., Feb. 10. — With property worth \$50,000, from which he derives a handsome annual income, Jack Raines of the Spur ranch continues to punch cattle at \$35 a month. Raines came to the Spur ranch twenty-eight years ago with the first bunch of cattle bearing the Spur brand, and the ranch has been his home ever since. He is now 47 years old. His face is lean and tanned to the color of leather. He is about 5 feet 10 inches in height and a bundle of sinews and muscles.

As a marksman Raines acknowledges no superior. He came to the West when the law of the survival of the fittest was in vogue. He can ride at full speed and clip the blossoms off sunflowers, never missing a

shot. Jack is modest. He will talk to a stranger of everything in the world except his own achievements, and not even his inborn politeness will make him sit for a photograph. He has never had a picture of himself made and he declares he never will. He is sorry that the railroad is coming in. He realizes that it is only a matter of time now until the vast Spur ranch, 433,000 acres in extent, will be put upon the market, and the man with the hoe will replace the man with the lasso. He is not reconciled to the impending change.
