WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—All attempts to pass at this time the census bill over President Roosevelt's veto, have been abandoned by the leaders of House and Senate. A hasty poll of both Houses was not encouraging, particularly in the Senate. The enactment of a census law will probably be made the subject of legislation at the special session of congress.

PEOPLE OF OREGON ARE URGED TO WAIT

Senator Bourne Advises That Roosevelt Have Full Sway In Asiatic Problem.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 12.—Senator Bourne sent the following telegram to Governor Chamberlain:

"I strongly urge the people of Oregon to patiently await the result of President Roosevelt's evident efforts to diplomatically, if possible, legislatively, if necessary, accomplish the final exclusion of Asiatic coolie labor from the United States. Maximum of results with minimum of irritation is the desideratum from every viewpoint. I personally shall strongly oppose the admission of Asiatic coolie labor, recognizing the impossibility of assimilation between the races, and the degeneration incident to competition with cheap labor; but believing success awaits President Roosevelt's efforts, would greatly deprecate at the present time any attempted state legislation which might seriously embarrass the President and neutralize his efforts.
