Council Tonight.—The Marshfield city council will meet this evening to take up the sewage question and also to determine what shall be done about the opening of 'B' street, between Front street and the Bay. It is likely that the salary proposition will also come up. A number of street matters will also come up if there is time to attend them.

Bad Walks Cause Grief.—The North Front street planking and walks are in bad shape as a result of the alterations following the operations of the dredge and the general repairs being made. A half dozen or more evening pedestrians attest this by bruises and some had narrow escapes from serious injury. Some who have to traverse the street are talking of petitioning the city council to at least have a temporary sidewalk put in until the street can be repaired.

ALLIANCE HAS
STORMY TRIP

Encounters Heavy Wind and As Result Arrives In Port 24 Hours Late.

After one of the most stormy voyages of the season the steamer Alliance entered the bay at daylight this morning, twenty-four hours late. She arrived opposite the bar about ten o'clock last evening, but Captain Parsons would not attempt to enter in the darkness, especially in view of the fact that a heavy sea was running, but the trip over the bar was made at daybreak without difficulty.

When the Alliance crossed the Columbia bar Sunday morning, she encountered a heavy southeast wind, which held for a day and a half before there was any sign of moderation. The ship was pitched and tossed about and progress was so slow that at times hardly five miles an hour was made. Even the lull in the storm was only temporary, a stiff breeze coming up again last night.

Most of the passengers suffered from seasickness and even members of the crew were affected. One of the sufferers was Purser Brown, who, although not incapacitated from duty, felt far from well.

"I have sailed for sixteen years," he said, this morning, "and in that time have run on this coast from Panama to Nome. Only twice in my life have I suffered from seasickness and this trip was one of the times. In fact, the other time I was sick was aboard the Alliance. It is not that the boat rolls so heavily but it is being out for so long a time in that continuous swell."

The Alliance will leave again for Portland tomorrow morning at 8 o'clock.
