

DESCRIPTION OF CHANDLER

Interesting Details and Data
of Coos Bay's Elegant
New Hotel.

Probably nowhere in the state of Oregon, or for that matter along the entire coast, is a town of the size of Marshfield blessed with a finer hotel than the new Chandler, and that the owners are assured of a brilliant future for Coos Bay is evidenced by the fact that they did not hesitate to invest thousands of dollars in erecting and equipping the new hostelry.

The Chandler is a brick structure of the latest style of building that is being erected throughout the country to be utilized for hotel purposes. As an additional precaution against fire, there is a fire apparatus on each of the floors and also on each floor at night a red light burns, indicating the position of the fire escapes.

Both as to exterior and interior finish, the building is an exceptionally fine one. The brick structure is faced with California cream colored brick, on a pile and concrete foundation, and has five floors and a basement. The ground floor is comprised of the lobby, women's reception room, writing room, dining room, grill, kitchen, barber shop, buffet and lavatories.

Lobby Spacious and Light.

The lobby is spacious and light, finished in early English oak, mission style, with massive columns, high wainscoting, beamed ceiling and mosaic tiled floor. Everything here as well in all other portions of the hotel is arranged for the convenience and comfort of the guests. The chairs, finished in early English oak to correspond with the wood work, are all upholstered, there is a cigar and news stand in one corner, and a public telephone booth for the convenience of the public generally as well as the guests. The clerk's desk is arranged in the most convenient manner and in the rear of it is a private office with glass partitions.

The women's reception room is a cozy apartment finished in dark native fir, with a fireplace and upholstered seats. In this room also is a library and a secretary where the guests may write their letters. The lighting fixtures are of brass and stained glass, a large pendant being in the center of the room and brackets on each side of the fireplace.

The writing room immediately off the lobby is finished in old English oak with chairs and individual desks, the latter being kept supplied with the hotel stationery.

Dining Room in Green.

The Colonial dining room is finished in green in the native fir and the color effect of the walls and ceiling runs from an orange tint to a lemon hue. For lighting purposes there are five pendants of burnished brass, four ceiling globes of prism glass and ten wall brackets. In this room are twenty tables each seating four persons, and a handsome sideboard with cut glass decorations.

The grill room is finished in the native fir, stained dark and the lighting effect is oxidized brass fixtures, one heavy pendant being in the center of the room.

HAIDED IN THE CHANDLER'S SUCCESS

The hundreds who have admired the handsome new Chandler hotel the last few days will be interested in knowing who helped construct and finish the handsome edifice and also those who are contributing to its future success.

The building which was designed by Architects Bennes, Hendricks and Tobey of Portland, was built by Olson, Johnson and Olson. So far as possible, Coos Bay products were used in the construction. Coos River bricks of the walls and the fixtures by local firms.

Lash's Work.

The painting and decorating was done by Chas. Lash of Marshfield. The enviable reputation which he established for himself in the painting and decorating of the Carleton Jewelry Store has been more than sustained by his work in the hotel. Mr. Lash also did the painting and decorating in the new Marshfield High School building which will be shortly thrown open. While Mr. Lash has been on Coos Bay, his work has more than established a reputation and business for himself as a high class artisan.

Lighting Fixtures.

The lighting fixtures and the ser-

ter of the room and one over each of the tables. Of the latter there are four seating two persons each and two seating four.

The kitchen is large, well lighted with three big skylights and well ventilated. Its equipment comprises two compartment Jewel ranges, steam table, charcoal broiler, electric dishwasher, steam dish warmer, silver and glassware sinks. John Richter of San Francisco, a chef of exceptional ability, will be monarch in this department, while Henry Hodar, also of San Francisco, will act as steward for the hostelry.

Barroom Not Finished.

The buffet although open, has not as yet been furnished owing to a delay in getting the fixtures from the North Bend Sash and Door Company. It will be finished in the native fir with high wainscoting and a sawed beam effect. The floor is of tile of a mosaic pattern. The bar and back bar will be finished in the native fir with a mahogany counter. Above the wainscoting will be a stein rail. At either end of the bar is a recess which will contain upholstered black seats for the convenience of the patrons. The lights will consist of a heavy burnished brass drop with side lights of the same pattern. The room also will contain a large refrigerator with French plate mirrors.

The four upper stories are divided guest rooms, seventeen rooms to each floor in suites of two or three and singles, with four private and two public baths to each floor. The rooms are commodious, light and airy, being what may be called all outside rooms.

Variety of Furniture.

The furniture in thirteen of the rooms on each floor is of mahogany, in three golden oak, and in one early English oak. The only exception is in the bridal chamber, on the first floor, the furniture of which is quarter sawed hazelwood. In each of the rooms there is a heavy pendant for lighting purposes and wall brackets. Each of the rooms will be provided with long distance telephones.

The basement contains the steam heating plant and is also utilized as a trunk room, store room, wine cellar and storage room for the kitchen department. The steam plant is equipped with an automatic feed pump and automatic force pump, the latter being for the ejection of waste water as well as sewage water.

The building is also equipped with an Otis electric passenger elevator with the latest automatic safety appliances.

Roof Garden Proposed.

In order that no portion of the building may go unused the management of the hotel proposes to establish a roof garden at the top of the structure but no steps will be taken toward this until summer. This garden will be fitted up in the style of similar gardens in the larger cities and will contain chairs and tables at which refreshments, both liquid and solid, will be served.
