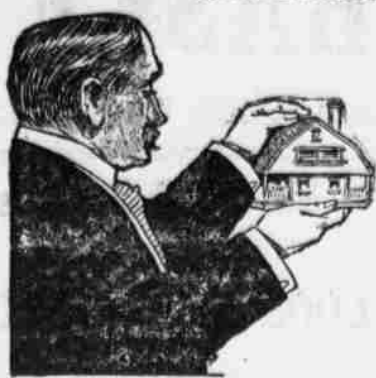

MARRIAGE SECRET
FOR 17 YEARS

Son's Wife Under Assumed Name Nursed Mother-In-Law Until Death.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Feb. 19.—Rather than distress his mother, who led him to believe she preferred him to remain single, John Dunn, a millwright of this city, for seventeen years kept the fact of his marriage from her. It was likewise a secret to Dunn's brothers and sisters until after the death of the mother, despite the fact that the woman who nursed Mrs. Dunn with tender care during her last sickness was the wife of her son.

The announcement of the marriage was made in Alton, where the elder Mrs. Dunn resided, a few days ago. The relatives of Dunn were greatly surprised to know that the woman who had won the affection of the entire family by her kind treatment of Mrs. Dunn while nursing her was the wife of the son.

Mrs. Dunn, the elder, was taken ill about a year ago, and owing to her advanced age the physicians offered but little hope of her recovery. Her three children, two of whom, daughters, reside in Memphis, Tenn., were in constant attendance on her during the early stages of her illness. Then their own household duties called them away, and it was decided to get a nurse. The son said he knew a woman in St. Louis whom he thought would accept the place, and a few days later a "Mrs. Murphy" came and took charge of the patient.

Her patience and kind treatment soon won the heart of Mrs. Dunn, senior, and a warm attachment sprang up between the two. When the elder Mrs. Dunn died one of the relatives, who addressed the nurse as "Mrs. Murphy," was informed that she was not "Mrs. Murphy," but Mrs. John Dunn, and that she had been so for seventeen years. Mr. Dunn substantiated this fact and gave as his reason for secrecy that if his mother learned of his marriage it would cause her worry.

Lloyd Enlund Rescues Mrs. Hitch From Drowning.

The Coquille Herald says: "On Friday afternoon as the steamer Echo landed at Fishtap an accident occurred which gave occasion for someone to show his courage and skill as a rescuer, and it so happened that that individual was present in the person of Lloyd Enlund. Mrs. Hitch of Fishtap, had been to town to see friends and do some shopping and was among the passengers wishing to get off at that landing, and in attempting to go ashore, she in some manner lost her balance and fell from the gangplank into the river. Several persons were near by but it was left for Mr. Enlund to do "the right thing at the right time" on this occasion. He was standing on the upper deck at the time of the accident, and as he saw the lady disappear beneath the muddy waters of the swollen stream, and realizing how quickly something must be done he leaped over the banister rail, and like an arrow, struck the water where the lady had disappeared in a twinkling, reappeared at the surface with her in his grasp. Grayhaired men of wide experience claim it to be the prettiest piece of work of "the kind they had ever witnessed." This, we believe, entitles this young man to a Carnegie medal."
