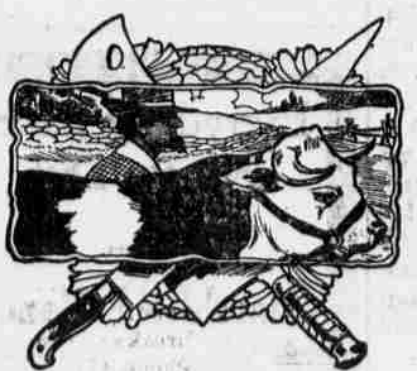

DOG MOTHERS TWO LION CUBS

SETTER GIVES UP FAMILY OF SIX BLIND PUPS TO TAKE CARE OF BIG STRANGERS.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Feb. 20. —Cuddled up in a soap box bed of soft straw in a secluded corner of the menagerie at the Hippodrome two tiny lion cubs are depending entirely upon the motherly care of a black and white setter for their life, liberty and happiness. Queen, a big South African lioness, mother of the cubs, died on the operating table in the animal hospital of the Hippodrome from acute pneumonia. Only a day or two after the cubs were born the mother was sent to the hospital and Dr. G. E. Nicholas, who was called to attend her, said she would not live. Pneumonia is nearly always fatal to lions. Queen's physician ordered the young monarchs of the forest taken from her. "I have a motherly old settler over at my office," he told Captain Cordonna, the head animal trainer. "She's now caring for a blind family of six pups. Guess we can give the pups away. The setter wandered into my place some time ago, wet, hungry and shivering with cold. I christened her Lost Hopes, on the spot and gave her a warm bed by the fire. I'm sure she'll remember that and not be fussy about an exchange of family."

So it happened that Lost Hopes became the only hope of the two cubs. Only five of the setter family were given away, one clumsy, big-headed little black and white pup is still a member of the Lost Hopes family—serving as a kind of peace offering to the accommodating mother.

At first Lost Hopes reserved her caresses for her own offspring and looked askance at the big, brownish, woolly looking strangers that were placed in the box with her. She didn't know, perhaps, that the lion cubs were valued at \$150 apiece and that \$300 would buy several hundred common babies like her own.

Now she has ceased making distinctions. The tiny setter pup, about one-third the size of the cubs, usually at the dinner hour takes a position in between his big adopted sister and brother, and cub gets licked and nosed as much as pup. The cubs at first roughed things a bit with the pup, but he was able to take care of himself.

MOST SUICIDES ARE MEN AND MARRIED MEN AT THAT

Chicago Table Shows 63 Killed Selves at Older Age and 119 at 30 to 40 Years Old.

CHICAGO, Ill., Feb. 20. — The number of inquiries held by the coroner during the fiscal year of 1908, according to his annual report to the county board, was 4214. Among these 535 suicides were found the heaviest month for suicides being April, with 53, and the lightest month being November, the last month of the fiscal year, with 28. One hundred and seventy-one homicides are reported for the year. Of these 117 were the result of shooting, 120 were murder cases and 15 were suicide and murder. Fourteen are recorded as accidental and twenty-three as justifiable. The number of persons held to the grand jury was 151.
