OREGON TAX LAW.

Prompt Payment Means Big Saving to Property Owners.

An Oregon newspaper prints the following summary of the Oregon tax law:

"If you pay taxes in full on or before March 15, 1909, you will be allowed a rebate of 3 per cent. If you pay taxes between March 15th and the first Monday in April, you will not receive any rebate, neither will there be added penalties and interest. You may pay half your taxes on or before the first Monday in April and then have until and including the first Monday in October, 1909, to pay the second half. In case at least one-half of your taxes are not paid on or before the first Monday in April, the entire tax becomes delinquent, and the law compels the sheriff to add 10 per cent penalty and interest at the rate of 12 per cent per annum on your taxes until paid. Under a decision of the supreme court no exemptions are allowed.

"Carefully examine your tax receipts when received and see that they describe all real property owned by you on February 10, 1909. The party owning real property February 10, 1909, is the one liable for the 1908 taxes upon the same without regard to whom it may be assessed. If you have sold any real property previous to February 10, 1909, the taxes should be paid by the purchaser and likewise should you have bought property previous to February 10, 1909, you should pay taxes on same although assessed to another party—this holds true unless a private contract to the contrary exists.

"Personal property taxes are payable by the one to whom assessed."

DRAIN STILL HOPES.

Newspaper There Believes Railway Work Will Soon Start.

Work on such a line will be commenced this coming summer—so Uncle Ed. Harriman says."

SHOOTING CLOUDS.

"Cloud shooting" is becoming a regular form of artillery practice in many European countries, the object of this atmospheric gunnery being to dispel threatened hailstorms. The most recent form of gun is a funnel-shaped barrel of iron, with a broad muzzle, so that the discharge shall be distributed over as large a space as possible. The effect of the discharge is to create a small but powerful whirlwind, which, it is found, disperses clouds that would otherwise descend in hail. So strong is the gust of wind sent upward that it sometimes kills or disables birds flying at great height overhead.

TREES IN PARIS.

There are 85,840 trees in Paris, and each tree has its number, age, history and condition recorded in the books at the Hotel de Ville. The appropriation for this department is 40,000 francs a year.

ISSUES CALL FOR MEETING

Oregon - Idaho Development Congress to Be Held in Boise February 26.

Judge Stephen A. Lowell of Pendleton, president of the Oregon-Idaho Development Congress, has just issued the call for the next session of the body to be held at Boise, February 26 and 27. The session promises to be one of the most important one the organization has held as it is proposed to have the Idaho State Constitution amended like the Oregon Constitution probably will be as a result of the legislature passing the bill allowing the voters to determine whether the people and the state can build their own railways. With Idaho and Oregon taking this action, it is declared that the Boise-Coos Bay Railway will be built by the people if Harriman, Hill or the Northwestern does not beat them to it.

It is probable that Coos Bay will have several representatives at Boise. As many Boise people are financially interested on Coos Bay, the two cities are bound together by unusually strong ties. The Marshfield Chamber of Commerce will probably name its delegates in a day or two.

Judge Lowell's call for the convention follows:

"To the People of Oregon and Idaho:—The Oregon-Idaho Development Congress will be held in Boise, February 26-27. The objects of this congress are to develop the states of Oregon and Idaho, particularly the Southern portions thereof, by the encouragement of irrigation projects, the building of railroads and other legitimate means.

"Included within Southern Oregon and Southern Idaho is one of the richest empires in the United States. This territory has hardly begun its development. It has less railroad mileage than any other section of our country in comparison with its wealth and resources. This territory must ultimately be the home of millions of people and with the proper encouragement, publicity and industry on the part of its own people it will within a few years shelter several hundred thousand inhabitants.

"One of the main objects of this congress is to build a railroad across Southern Oregon into Southern Idaho. Such a railroad would cause a marvelous development, and would advance both states far beyond the present stage. It would prove of inestimable value to every city within 100 miles of it and would probably be the means of bringing to us new transcontinental roads from the east.

"You are urged to appoint delegates to this congress and to make every effort to have your delegates attend. This is not a large convention but it is one which is in dead earnest. The organization has set out to do a certain work and that work must be done in the very near future. If Oregon and Idaho are to be developed as they should be, the people of these states must cease to wait for promoters to come from the east; they must awaken and do the development work themselves."

FORESTRY IN JAPAN.

For 1,200 years the people of Japan have been planting forests, with a success that has been a little short of marvelous. Under careful management the Japanese forests yield very high financial returns. This high yield is only made possible by the close utilization of every bit of the tree so that scarcely a twig is wasted, and by the improvement of the growth of their forests by carefully conducted thinning and tending Japan has effectually prevented the stripping of her mountain slopes. In some districts, where the mountains are near the towns, the steep slopes have already been cleared, and this has resulted in floods and the washing down of the soil from the slopes on to the farm lands. But these cases have been exceptional and have merely served as a warning.
