The snow was so deep that he lost the trail and he tramped for two days from Golden Falls without seeing a house. He carried no blanket or provisions and reached the Wyatt home badly exhausted.

Returns From 'Frisco.—The "Duke" of Finland who lately returned from San Francisco, was well pleased with his trip. "Duke" Robert Hendrickson is well and favorably known on Coos Bay. For many years, he ran a logging camp on Coos River and the only grudge his men had against him was that he paid them in full for their services.

Couldn't Locate Daughter.—The funeral of Luther O. Lighthall, the Ten Mile man who was stricken with heart failure on Wednesday, was held from Johnson's Undertaking Parlors at 1 o'clock this afternoon. Every effort was made to notify a daughter of the deceased, said to reside in Cairo, Mich., but nothing was heard from her and J. B. Hibbard of Marshfield, a nephew, had charge of the burial.

Dredge to Move.—The dredge Oregon has nearly completed the cutting down of the shoal opposite the Cold Storage and will move in a few days up near the coal bunkers and start filling Broadway. It is expected that the Broadway work will begin early next week. Until the dredge secures more pipe, it will be impossible for it to do anything towards filling the Railroad addition flat as has been proposed. With the \$25,000 from the jetty fund available, more pipe can be purchased.

Fined For Deer Slaughter.—John Hurst of Langlois, last week was convicted and fined \$50 for killing deer out of season. He was prosecuted by Deputy Prosecuting Attorney L. A. Liljeqvist. Hurst's defense was the "Unwritten law of Curry County," which, interpreted, was claimed to mean that a Curry county citizen has a right to kill deer whenever the opportunity presents. It was claimed that everyone in Curry county obeyed the unwritten law but the Langlois Justice held that the law of the State of Oregon which prohibits the killing of deer except in the open season is higher than the "Unwritten law of Curry."

OREGON TO GET ABOUT \$835,000

Rivers and Harbors Bill Carries This Amount For State's Waterways.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—Out of the total appropriation carried by the River and Harbor bill, as framed by the House Committee and passed by the House, \$835,000 will be expended on rivers and harbors of the Portland Engineering district. The measure makes a lump appropriation for the maintenance of works heretofore begun, the amount of this sum being intended to continue the preservation of such works until July 1, 1910, when it is expected another river and harbor bill will become operative.

The apportionment of the \$835,000 in Oregon will be as follows:

Mouth Columbia river (jetty construction)	\$500,000
Mouth Columbia river operation dredge)	200,000
Columbia and Willamette, Portland to sea	100,000
Upper Willamette and Yamhill	20,000
Columbia River, Vancouver to mouth Willamette	5,000
Tillamook bay and bar	5,000
Snake River	5,000
Total	\$835,000

The surveys to be made in Oregon are:

Columbia and Willamette, from Portland to sea, with view of obtaining 30-foot channel.

Willamette Falls, with view to determining whether or not the government should acquire the canal and locks at Oregon City, and if so, at what cost; also to determine whether it is more advisable to build new canal and locks, and if so, on which side of the river.

Yaquina Bay, from Yaquina to Elk City.

Umpqua River bar.

Columbia River, from its mouth to Myrtle Point.

Siuslaw River, at its mouth.

Willamette River, from Oregon City to Eugene.

Clatskanie River.

Wood River, from Klamath Lake to the head of navigation.

In addition to these local provisions, the bill provides that the unexpended balance of the appropriation for the Coos Bay jetty shall be utilized, in conjunction with \$15,000 raised locally, for operating the new government dredge Oregon in improving the channels of Coos Bay and its tributaries.

SUES BROTHER FOR BOARD BUT LOSES

Mrs. Jas. Durrand Beaten In Suit to Collect \$84 From Thomas J. Cottell.

In Justice of the Peace C. L. Penneck's court yesterday afternoon, suit was brought against Thomas J. Cottell by James Durrand and Agnes Durrand, his wife, for collection of alleged board and lodging bill of \$148 due them from defendant. Counter suit was filed in the sum of \$84, which the defendant claims is due him for services. Although a joint contract was said to have been made between the interested parties, Durrand testified that he knew nothing about it and that it was made by his wife and the defendant. The suit was dismissed and Attorney Jochen, for the plaintiffs, filed a bill of exceptions to the ruling and will take the case to the higher court. C. B. Selby was counsel for the defense. Cottell is a brother of Mrs. Durrand, one of the plaintiffs.
