MAJOR KINNEY WINS SUIT FROM R. H. SMITH

**Judge Hamilton Hands Down Deci-
sion in Action Over Terms
of Deeds.**

Judge C. A. Sehlbrede, attorney
for Major Kinney received notice
yesterday from County Clerk Wat-
son that Judge Hamilton had just
handed down his decision in the
case of L. D. Kinney vs. R. H. Smith
and Bertha J. Smith.

In this case, Judge Hamilton holds
that the Warranty deed executed
November 9th, 1907, by L. D. Kin-
ney and wife to Bertha J. Smith, is
in effect a mortgage to secure to
the defendant, R. H. Smith, the pay-
ment of the sum of \$2,000 upon
which \$300 has been paid, leaving
a balance due of \$1,700, and de-
creed that plaintiff pay to the de-
fendant, R. H. Smith, within ninety
days the sum of \$1,700 with interest
at 6 per cent from November 9th,
1907.

It was claimed by the defendants
that the deed was absolute, while
Kinney claimed the deed was only
intended as a mortgage to secure the
\$2,000, of which amount \$300 was
afterwards paid.

Major Kinney was represented by
Judge Sehlbrede, and R. H. and
Bertha J. Smith were represented by
Hall & Hall and Snover & Feeney.

MAN IS 1,000,000 YEARS OLD

LONDON, March 4.—Dr. W. Al-
len Sturge of Ickingham hall, Suf-
folk, who is an archaeologist of re-
pute, enunciated a new theory of the
age of man in an address to the
East Anglian society of Prehisto-
rians at Ipswich.

His investigations, he said, led
him to believe that the Neolithic
period began somewhere about 200,-
000 years ago, and that the Patheic
period began probably before the
penultimate glacial period, or 900,-
000 years ago, and came to an end
about 500,000 years ago, the inter-
vening period being occupied by the
age of cave men.

DISCUSS PROPOSED NEW SEWAGE SYSTEM

**Engineer Sandberg and Members of
the Council Talk Over Needs
of City.**

City Engineer Sandberg and
Councilmen Coke, Savage, Albrecht,
Nelson and Sacchi last evening had
an informal meeting to discuss the
proposed sewage system. Mr. Sand-
berg pointed out that if it was the
intention to provide for the future
development of the city that it would
be necessary to put in pumping sta-
tions so that the sewers would drain
basements. Mr. Sandberg said that
the cost of putting in a pumping
station would be only about \$500
and that it would cost \$15 or less
a month to operate it. Aside from
the drainage of basements, Mr.
Sandberg said that the recent high
tides had demonstrated that a gravi-
ty system would cause serious dam-
age here.

The session was brief and no deci-
sion was reached. It will be taken
up by the council in regular session
next week, probably.

ROOSEVELT TO SAIL

**Will Leave March 23 On African
Trip.**

FLOUR ADVANCES 25 CENTS PER SACK HERE

**Corner in the Wheat Market Causes
Big Advance in Price of Bread-
stuff On Local Market.**

Another advance of twenty cents per
barrel in the price of flour here is
announced. This makes a total ad-
vance of about \$1.00 per barrel or
twenty-five cents per sack within the
last two months.

"The price of flour is altogether
too high," said F. S. Dow today.
"It is too high because it is due
entirely to the corner in wheat se-
cured by Ware and Leland for Pat-
ten, the present wheat king. It is
true that there is a shortage of mill-
ing flour on the Pacific coast but
the world's supply of milling flour
is as large or larger than usual at
this season of the year. It is
shame that the price of breadstuff
can be so manipulated by a crowd of
speculators."

Ware and Leland who are Patten's
brokers, almost became interested on
Coos Bay a few months ago, having
nearly swung a deal for the pur-
chase of the steamer M. F. Plant and
the Oregon Coal and Navigation
Company's property here.

PAYS DEATH PENALTY.

**H. Shumway Hanged in Nebraska
After Fifth Reprieve.**

LINCOLN, Neb., March 5.—H.
Shumway, who had five times escap-
ed the execution of the death sen-
tence on technicalities, was hanged
today for the murder of Mrs. Jacob
Martin, wife of a wealthy farmer.
He protested his innocence to the
end and died bravely.
