CULLINGS OF COQUILLE

News of the Valley as Told by the Sentinel.

Assessor Thrift started out Monday on his two months' job of finding out how much the county is worth. He took four deputies with him and will begin the work at Marshfield, expecting to be in that section over two weeks.

The Barker Bros. are engaged in moving their sawmill into Fairview from a point near that place. The mill will be started up again as soon as the work of removal is completed, and planing for the Coos Bay highway will be cut as rapidly as possible.

Seely & Anderson are planning to resume logging operations down the river in a fortnight or so. They must of necessity seek new scenes of activity, as the timber was all cut from the claims where they operated last year. Both gentlemen returned last Friday from a business trip to Portland.

Messrs. Raymond and Tyre, two Coos Bay gentlemen succeeded in effecting the preliminary work looking to the organization of a nest of "Owls" in this city last Sunday.

Died—At Portland, February 25, Mrs. Leone Teutch. Mrs. Teutch was a cousin of the Mast family, and lived in Coos county many years ago.

Norman O. Dodge, of Myrtle Point, was severely kicked by a horse a few days ago, the hoof of the animal striking him on the shin. It was a painful but not serious injury.

Captain Chas. Bruce was in Coquille Monday on his return to the Bay from Bandon. Captain Bruce was sent here from San Francisco by the underwriters to take temporary charge of the schooner San Buenaventura, which was dismasted and all but wrecked off Cape Blanco Dec. 22nd last. He will take the vessel, which has been repaired, direct to the coast's metropolis.

CURRY COUNTY NEWS.

Events in Neighboring Section as told By Port Orford Tribune.

Ed. Ashman came down from Coos Bay last Friday and spent a couple of days visiting at the home of Walter Sutton on Hubbard's creek. Ed. is employed in the Smith mill at Marshfield, and started on the return Monday.

G. W. Curry returned Sunday from a trip to Bandon after freight. George is authority for the statement that the old road through the green timber is actually in better condition than the average road between this place and the city by the sea, notwithstanding the fact that it has been practically unworked for years.

Port Orford harbor was fairly smooth last Friday, Saturday and Sunday, and a boat would have experienced no trouble in landing at the wharf. When the Arcata, an old craft with insufficient power, called at this place it was seldom that she missed landing more than two trips in succession during the stormiest months, but now an idea seems to be prevalent in some places that a staunch boat is in danger in our port when even gentle sephyras blow and that something like \$400 is only a fair compensation for making about a 16-hour run to this "awful" place.

NEW BOATS PROMISED.

Rumors at Bandon of Two More Vessels.

BANDON, Ore., March 6.—Edmund Hall Chaney has been here for a few days, looking into the situation with the idea of putting in another sawmill on the Coquille river and building a steamer to ply between here and San Francisco, to carry the lumber from his mill. His idea is to build the ship at the shipyards in this city, which will be a great boon, as the shipyards have been lying idle for some time. There is also talk at the local yards of building another boat to ply between here and Coos Bay.

MYRTLE POINT POINTERS.

News of Upper Coquille Valley as told By the Enterprise.

B. C. Lehmanowsky, who has been in California during a portion of the winter, returned to Myrtle Point this week. His visit to the south served to improve his health very materially.

Owners of timber land, range and other property in the Catching creek valley and other points far distant, are objecting to a tax that has been levied for the building of a five-mile stretch of road on the South Fork, and propose to fight the assessment. A number of large land holders are concerned.

Tommy Davis, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Davis, formerly of this city, is making a record as a member of the Long Beach, California, high school track team, with the Monrovia team as competitor, the Long Beach squad captured the honors. Davis won the 100 yard dash in 11 seconds, the 220 yard dash in 25 2-5 seconds, and tied for the 440 yard dash in 55 2-5 seconds. Tommy credits his success to the start in training he received here before leaving for California.

Mrs. A. S. Bennett, nearly eighty years of age, suffered a stroke of paralysis at her home on the hill Saturday of last week, and has since been very low. One side was completely paralyzed and she lost the power of speech. Because of her advanced years her friends fear that she will not entirely recover from the stroke.

In the recent contest case heard before Commissioner Dodge in which Bert Folsom contested the homestead right of J. D. Culbertson, a decision has been rendered in favor of the latter, at the Roseburg land office. C. A. Sehlbrede and J. O. Stemmler were attorneys for Folsom, while A. J. Sherwood and L. A. Roberts represented Culbertson.

E. W. Hermann has the utmost confidence in the honor of the people of Myrtle Point, which he exhibited the other night by carefully locking the door of his store and leaving the key on the outside all night. His confidence was not misplaced. The door had not been opened and nothing was missed. His wife has appointed herself his guardian for the future, fearing that he may deliver the key to the first burglar who may come along and ask for it.

It is expected that the appraisers and surveyors will soon make a division of the Hoffman farm at the mouth of the South Fork river, C. W. Dye having purchased the Fred Hoffman portion. The appraisers are David McNair, R. C. Dement and Wm. Warner.

Mr. John D. Carl, son of Mrs. Amanda Carl, of Portland, and Miss Edna May Schroeder, youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Schroeder, of Norway, were united in marriage Wednesday, March 3rd, at noon, by Rev. Thos. Barklow, of this city, in the presence of a large number of relatives and friends. Both are natives of Coos county, and children of the sturdy Coos county pioneer stock. They will make their home on the old Carl homestead at Norway.

SAY BAKERS' BREAD IS BETTER THAN MOTHER'S

KANSAS CITY, Mo., March 5.—Baker's bread is better than any mother ever tried to make, according to the executive committee of the National Association of Master Bakers, who met here to make plans for the annual gathering to be held in Minneapolis.

The committee decided to appropriate a large sum of money to place advertising matter in every part of the country, displaying the claim to superiority in the baking of bread as against the claims of mother. The committee also adopted a resolution favoring the federal inspection of eggs.

He has successfully used in animals arteries that have been kept alive in refrigerators for sixty days.
