JOHNSON TRIES TO PASS BILL

Anti-Jap Agitator In California Legislature Attempts to Revive Measure.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., March 8. — Grove L. Johnson, author of the Japanese school segregation bill that aroused so much antagonism with Washington earlier in the session, withdrew today the joint resolution he had introduced in the assembly calling upon congress to enact an Asiatic exclusion law. The bill had been referred to Speaker Stanton as a committee of one and Johnson feared it would rest in the speakers pocket and so introduced a substitute embodying the same features, which was referred to the committee on introduction of bills which will probably refuse to endorse it.
